**WASHINGTON CARRIES OFF HONORS IN MEET**

Oakland, Cal., April 11.—Washington university carried away the honors with flying colors in the intercollegiate regatta on the Oakland estuary today, when her varsity crew outdistanced the Stanford and California crews.

The race was run over a three mile course. Washington's time was 19:01; Stanford finished second in 19:14, and California was third in 19:45.

Thousands of persons witnessed the race from the estuary shores and from abroad special trains of the Southern Pacific, which were run on tracks that parallel the shore, and on chartered tugs and bay craft.

The first race was that between the freshmen of the three universities. It was over a two mile course. Stanford won in 13:19 and distanced Washington over the finishing tape by three lengths. California freshmen came in last.

The utmost enthusiasm marked the progress of the race. Students with fair coats sent their college yells over the water in favor of their respective crews.

Despite the evident efforts of the other crews to bring victory to their colleges, the Washington varsity men apparently had an easy time in distancing the California and Stanford rowers.

In the varsity race, the California men attributed their defeat in a measure to the fact that they changed their stroke in the middle of the race. They had been pulling a new long stroke, but in the heat of the race they changed this, falling back into their old stroke, a short and choppy one.

After this change the Washington rowers were seen to make their biggest gain. It was at this point that Stanford also began to outdistance Berkeley.

**KELLY TEAM WINNER OF NORTHWEST PURSE**

Portland, April 11.—With 2,792 pins to their credit, the J. E. Kelly five man team of Portland is the winner today of the title and \$350 purse for the highest total of the Northwestern Bowling Congress. The M. L. Klimes of Portland were second with 2,789, the Basil Stars of Seattle third with 2,780, and Gerald Cafe team of Seattle fourth with 2,762.

The Basil Stars jumped into third place last night, displacing the Gerald's by 18 pins. Other teams which finished in the prize money are: Imperial Hotel, Portland, 2,752; Hop Golds, Portland, 2,747; Lotus Club, Vancouver, 2,733; Oregon Alloys, Portland, 2,668; Seattle Athletic Club, 2,660; Seattle Motor Car, Spokane, 2,636.

By rolling 614 pins last night Melvin of the Imperial hotel five took the lead in the singles and aggregate, with 756 pins, two ahead of Perry, the Seattle bowler. Melvin's score is 756. Santor of the Inland Market, Spokane, leads in the single games with 268 and the doubles is led by Leap and Christian, Portland, with 1,213 pins. The tournament closes tonight and will be followed by an elaborate banquet.
