CITY NEWS.

'I should worry,' said Attorney James Helzel this morning when asked how he was running. Attorney Helzel is a candidate for the state senate and he didn't seem to be worrying very much this morning as to how he could or would run for the office.

Three days have now passed without an arrest being made in Salem, according to the chief of police today. This is a record mark and, from the appearance of things this afternoon, there does not seem to be any chance for the officers to get in action on the fourth day. Everybody is working too hard now to find time for trouble; say the police, and arrests will be few and far between if present conditions continue to prevail. Even the city recorder's office is experiencing rather dull times at present while Justice of the Peace Webster declares that there is absolutely nothing doing.

THREATEN TO CAUSE SOME TROUBLE OVER INCIDENT.

Washington, April 11.—Chafing under the restrictions imposed by Admiral Mayo, American, on the foreign warship commanders at Tampico, the British and German admirals were reported here today as threatening to land marines in the face of all objections unless the destruction of their nations' property on shore ceases.

There is no question, from all accounts that both federals and rebels were disregarding Mayo's warning that the fighting must be so conducted as to avoid damage to foreigners. The fire of the federal gunboats in particular was wreaking great havoc and there seemed no disposition on the artillery men's part to discontinue.

If British and German marines should land, it was said the Americans probably would have to follow their example. Mayo was in constant wireless communication with Admiral Fletcher at Vera Cruz, and Fletcher was empowered to his own discretion. Secretary of State Bryan was in close touch with the situation.

Secretary of the Navy Daniels said he had forwarded to President Wilson at White Sulphur Springs Admiral Mayo's report of the arrest of American sailors at Tampico but he had not yet heard whether General Zaragoza, the Tampico federal commander, had apologized and saluted the American flag, as demanded by Mayo.

The states department reports indicated chaos at Torreon, although General Villa promised United States Consul Hamm to protect foreigners, it was said he continued to deport Spaniards and to confiscate their property.

No Possibility of Trouble.

Mexico City, Mex., April 11.—There seemed no possibility today of trouble over the incident of the arrest Thursday at Tampico of a paymaster and a party of marines from the United States gunboat Dolphin, who had put in to shore in a launch after a supply of gasoline.

It was fully established that as soon as General Zaragoza, the federal com-

mander, heard what had happened he ordered the prisoners released and they were safely back in their launch within two hours. It was even reported that Zaragoza placed Colonel Hinojosa, who was responsible for the affair, under arrest.

'President Huerta is deeply distressed,' said American Charge d' Affaires O'Shaughnessy. He apologized to me and cabled to Washington. It is fact that a demand has been made that the Tampico authorities salute the American flag but a 24 hours time limit was not fixed. That would be too embarrassing.'

BANDITS' TRIAL MONDAY

THIEVES WHO ATTEMPTED \$250,000 ROBBERY TO APPEAR BEFORE JUDGE McNARY.

The sequel to the daring hold-up attempted last Saturday, when two masked men made a gun play and grabbed a suit case carried by Milton Meyers and supposed to contain \$250,000, will take place Monday night when they are brought up for trial before Judge McNary. The capture of the hold-up men was a pretty piece of

detective work and reflects great credit on our home sleuths and they will now probably get their just deserts from the jury which will hear the case. The trial will be held in the Commercial club rooms. Judge McNary presiding with John Turner counsel for the plaintiff and Walter Winslow for the defense. The whole membership of the Cherrians have been subpoenaed to appear as witnesses, as the \$250,000 was Cherrian money which is to be used at the Cherringo to be held at the armory April 24 and 25.
