FIGHTERS READY FOR GONG TO START MILL

Champion Ritchie 10 to 4 Favorite Over Harlem Tommy Murphy in Last Bout.

YOUTH EXPECTED TO BEAT EXPERIENCE

Both Scrappers Fit As a Fiddle and the Loser Will Have no Excuse to Offer.

San Francisco, April 17.—Willie Ritchie, champion lightweight will defend his world title here tonight at Coffroth's Eighth Street open air arena against Harlem Tommy Murphy of New York. Both fighters were pronounced to be as fit as the grind of training could make them, and a torrid battle was expected by the fans.

Ritchie will be an almost prohibitive favorite. The betting public is offering 10 to 4 that he will be returned the winner and even money that Murphy does not last 20 rounds.

Close followers of the game say that Ritchie has everything that goes to make a champion. He is game, clever, has plenty of stamina, a corking punch and plenty of brains. In addition to these, he is young—23. Murphy has experience and brains, but is said to lack a punch.

Ritchie has shown that he can stand up under fire. He took a terrific beating from Wolgast for fifteen rounds and then had sufficient strength to put Wolgast to the mat. Joe Rivers also made him look like a novice in the early rounds of their July 4 fight, but the champion rallied and knocked out the Mexican.

Neither Ritchie or Murphy has had any trouble regarding the weight. The articles call for the men to weigh in at 135 pounds one hour before the battle. They have been within striking distance of this figure for several days.

"I was never more confident of victory in my life," Ritchie said today. "I am going into the bout with the determination to end it as quickly as possible. Charges that I am afraid of Murphy have gotten under my skin and I intend to show the people of my home town that they were unwarranted."
