BROOKLYN FEDERALS HAVE BIG PAYROLL

Walter Ward Says the Team Will Draw Down About \$1000,000 in Salaries.

TWO STAR TWILERS TO BE SIGNED UP

Outlaw Magnates Are Jubilant Over Loyal Support Given by the Fans Generally.

New York, April 21.—According to Treasurer Walter Ward, the team that will represent Brooklyn in the Federal league this season will be the best paid team in baseball. Bill Bradley's troupe, it was said, will cost upwards of \$100,000 in salaries and two star pitchers will soon be signed, it was claimed, that will give that mark a big jump skyward. For its talent the Brooklyn Federals will play nearly \$40,000 more than any other club in the new organization. It has been generally supposed that the Giants and Boston Red Sox teams received top notch salaries but the pay roll of the Brooklyn Federals has made another record. If three more stars can be captured the Wards say they will give their money even more exorbitant in order to give Brooklyn a first class team.

An even fight for the new organization is predicted by James A. Gilmore, president of the Federal league, who is jubilant over the way the fans are turning out to see his club play. He declared all the clubs in his organization were about evenly matched and that the race for the pennant will be a hard one. In contrast the outlaw leader said the Athletics and Giants would repeat again and that the National league would be over by August 1st.

Matty McCue, said to be one of the most promising light weights ever developed in Wisconsin, was scheduled to clash ten rounds in Racine tonight with Joe Mandot of New Orleans. Jimmy Walsh, a brother of Harry Walsh, the old time middleweight, has been acting as McCue's sparring partner and looks for Matty to stop Mandot.

INTER-COUNTY CONTEST: LANE AND MARION

Plans for an inter-county fruit and vegetable canning contest between Lane and Marion county girls at the Oregon state fair in September were completed in a conference between P. W. Rader and Luther J. Chargin, county agriculturists of Lane and Marion county respectively, says the Eugene Guard. The contests are arranged for the purpose of introducing modern methods of steam pressure canning in the rural homes of the state. It is one attempt to aid the rural housewife with scientific kitchen machinery, and the proposal of the two farm experts is to demonstrate canning machinery in the schools and in the home between now and the state fair.

The contest at Salem will be made one of the most important features of the fair. Arrangements have been made for motion pictures of the girls at work for display over the nation, and the canning demonstration will be continuous throughout the six days of the fair. Two contests will be held each day between teams of five girls each. For each of these twelve contests prizes of \$10, \$7.50 and \$5 will be offered.

The Eugene teams will be selected by similar contests held during the three days of the Lane county fair, the week previous to the state fair. The winning teams of the contests here will have the expenses of a trip to the Salem fair paid for. The Marion county teams will be selected in some different manner, but representative teams will be taken from the Chemawa Indian school, the Salem high school and the Marion county rural schools.

The plans for the contest include the growing of products for canning at home before the fair. Each team will have its time divided into two periods, and during the first of these periods they will can products of their own growing, and the second period, that for which they will be timed for speed, is that on which the prizes will be granted. Efficiency and appearance will also be counted in the awarding of prizes. The two counties are the only ones in the state that will participate in these demonstrations.

According to the county agriculturist home canning machines, which can be purchased for only a few dollars, will revolutionize the canning process of the housewife. The canning under steam pressure permits a more perfect sterilization of the fruit, it is claimed, and it permits the use of tin cans and saves the housewife time.

At an all-day agricultural rally to be held at Thurston, early in May, and at which H. T. French, state agriculturist, L. J. Chapin and P. W. Rader will be present, demonstrations of mechanical canning for the housewife will be made. To this meeting farmers are planning to come for miles around, and the affair will be one of the most unique rural educational picnics ever held in the state.

At the conference of the two agriculturists today plans were also laid for inter-county competition at a corn fair to be held at Salem in November. Farmers from both counties will compete for prizes for displays of exhibits of corn. The fair, the first ever held in the state, is arranged in the interest of introducing corn growing in Oregon.

The authorities declare that the farmers of Oregon have a mistaken impression that corn cannot be successfully grown in Oregon. They predict that two or three years will see it a leading crop, and that it will be a factor in making Oregon a leading hog and cattle state.

According to Mr. Rader some fifteen Lane county farmers will plant corn especially for this exhibit.

Mr. Rader and Mr. Chapin today went to Pleasant Hill to make experiments in the inoculation of soil and the use of lime to neutralize acid soil.

formation whatever." Bryan refused to discuss the orders issued today to Admiral Fletcher at Vera Cruz, adding: "I have nothing to say on the matter of procedure. When I have something to say I will say it. That ends it."

President Is Impatient. While the senate held up the resolution supporting his policy in Mexico President Wilson fumed with impatience today.

His impatience was natural. Either already in the custom house at Vera Cruz or about to be unloaded there, he had learned, were 200 Krupp machine guns of the latest model and 2,000,000 rounds of ammunition ordered in Germany by President Huerta for the special purpose of defending the Vera Cruz Mexico City railroad.

To gain control of this railroad will be one of the United States' foremost tasks in Mexico. Unless they previously seize the German arms and ammunition shipment it is certain that it will be used against themselves.

Yet the president hesitated at ordering the seizure without congressional approval of his course. In fact, assuming the shipment to be still on board a German ship, seizure was out of the question under international law with out the previous declaration of a blockade and, again, the executive wanted the lawmakers to sanction him before he declared a blockade.

Resolution Is Approved. The resolution of approval of the president's course had already been so amended in the senate as to make it appear that the administration's quarrel is with the Huerta government rather than with Huerta himself. In this form, it was expected it would be adopted but it will be necessary for it to back to the house even then.

In addressing congress somewhat as if the Mexican dispute were a personal one between himself and President Huerta it was the pretty general opinion that President Wilson made a mistake and that this was what had caused the delay.

The opinion grew more general as the day advanced that the army would soon be involved in a Mexican campaign, though President Wilson has said it would be unnecessary, and the war department had received word from every state that the militia establishment was ready to take the field.

May Seize Coast Towns. Not only was there every prospect that Vera Cruz and Tampico would soon be occupied by forces of United States marines but all important west coast towns were about to be seized and troops, it was said, would shortly take possession of points along the border.

American refugees were pouring into Vera Cruz from Mexico City. President Huerta announced he would protect them but there was much fear for their safety nevertheless. Even for those in the northern territory, under rebel control, there was considerable anxiety.

Washington, April 21.—Navy department officials were in savage humor today over the repeated assertions from Mexico City that no flag was flying over the boat in which Assistant Paymaster Kopp and his men went ashore from the United States gunboat Dolphin at the time of their arrest in Tampico.

The Mexican authorities have not even taken the trouble to put this statement in the form of a specific denial of the American version that the flag was flying. They have simply mentioned incidentally that there was no flag, as if everybody knew what they said was a fact and there was no controversy about it.

At the navy department it was not denied that this attitude was galling officialdom greatly.

Refugees Go Aboard Ships

Vera Cruz, Mex., April 21.—Eighty-seven American refugees, including men, women and children, today were aboard the steamship Mexico and Esperanza, chartered by the United States government to take them home. The Mexico was to have sailed last night but was unable to leave on account of high winds and a rough sea. General Maas today received instructions from President Huerta to secure peace in Vera Cruz at any cost. The Pearson Oil company's trade boat San Eduardo was held in readiness to respond to orders of the British consul.

AX FALLS IN POLICE DEPARTMENT OF CITY

McAllister has grown into the light heavyweight class and it is doubtful if Manager Kearns will allow Murray to fight unless McAllister will make 158 pounds at 8 o'clock.

A Raid On Dogs

The question of dogs running at large in the city was taken up briefly by the committee on ordinances. Walter Spaulding, chairman of the committee, reported that it is being planned to erect a cage in which to confine the stray pups and also arrange for several dog nets to be made with which to capture the animals.

Want Street Narrower

Property owners along Mill street between Church and High, submitted a petition asking that the proposed improvement along that section be corrected to include only 30 feet instead of 42, for the reason that several trees in front of the residents will be disturbed.

The Woodmen of the World Lodge

petitioned the council to allow certain streets in the city to be used by it for the regular annual carnival which is to be held here in the second week of June. Permission was granted and the affair will be held under the supervision of the police department. A total of 2545 sewer refund claims have been filed with the city recorder.

General Funston to Embark

Houston, Texas, April 21.—General Funston, commanding at Texas City, was ordered today to embark the Fifth brigade immediately from Galveston for Tampico. The brigade includes the Fourth, Seventeenth and Nineteenth regiments. Other forces ordered to embark were the Sixth cavalry, Third field artillery, company D of the signal corps, the Second battalion of engineers, except company F, and ambulance company No. 3. Funston recommended that the aviation squadron at San Diego be brought immediately to Texas City.

Cooks and Waiters Wanted

Galveston, Texas, April 21.—Three hundred cooks and waiters were sought here today for transports, for immediate service. Marine engineers also were in demand.

Machine Guns and Ammunition

Washington, April 21.—It was learned today that the arms and ammunition shipment from Germany for President Huerta at Vera Cruz included 200 Krupp machine guns of the latest model and 2,000,000 rounds of ammunition. Huerta ordered them especially to defend the Vera Cruz-Mexico City railroad. It was this shipment President Wilson was so anxious to have seized.

Towns Call for Protection

Washington, April 21.—Fears were expressed in official circles today that inhabitants of American towns on the northern Mexican border were in danger. Secretary of War Garrison admitted that from two towns telegrams had been received saying murder and rapine were apprehended General Bliss was instructed to furnish military protection, if necessary.

Mexican Quarters Patrolled

El Paso, Texas, April 21.—American soldiers patrolled the Mexican quarter here last night to prevent disturbances. No attempt was made to interfere with the Mexicans, but Colonel Hatfield sent out patrols as a precautionary measure.

HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

Dan Crawford spoke before the assembly of the Salem high school Monday morning. Mr. Crawford has been a missionary in the heart of Africa for 42 years, and gave many interesting stories about crocodiles, elephants and lions.

Miss Maud Davis has taken the place of Grace McGregor, teacher of English in the Salem high school. Miss McGregor is unable to teach on account of her health. Miss Davis was formerly head of the English department in the Salem high school.

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The diplomatic corps, except American Charge d' Affaires O'Shaughnessy, conferred here last night with Foreign Minister Portillo Y. Rojas. President Huerta was not present.

Sir Lionel Carion, recently appointed British minister at Rio De Janeiro, Brazil, was expected to reach Mexico City during the day. Diplomats hoped he would persuade Huerta to yield to the United States but there is very little chance of him receding from his present belligerent stand.

President Huerta has assured the American transportation committee, that even if war comes, he will give Americans here all possible aid.

Squadron Increases Speed

On board the battleship Arkansas, by wireless, April 21.—Admiral Badger said today he expected the Arizona, leading his battleship squadron, to reach Tampico at 8 a. m. Wednesday. The squadron was increasing its speed. Drilling and rifle practice were going on steadily.

Mexicans Are Fanned

Calxico, Cal., April 21.—Residents of Calxico are waiting feverishly today for the arrival from Monterey, Cal., of a troop of cavalry.

At Mexicali, opposite this border point, 350 Mexican regulars are encamped. Calxico is unprotected, and in the event of drastic action by congress in the Mexican situation, it is feared here that the Mexicans will raid this town.

Ranchers from the vicinity of Sharps heading, where headgates are located that control the water supply for 300,000 acres of land and thousands of ranches, reported that Mexican troops are encamped close by. The destruction of the headgates would cause a loss of hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Too Much Expense

Councilman Jones took the floor last night and explained the reasons why the four city employees were discharged. He said that the work in the respective departments has been greatly reduced in volume of late owing to street paving being dropped and other improvements in the city reduced to the minimum, or words to that effect. A resolution was passed which ordered that Messrs. Elgin and Miss Crossan be dismissed and the body adjourned temporarily for the purpose of giving the police committee and the chief of police time in which to consider the request to discharge the two policemen.

The Chief Is Puzzled

When asked how he would arrange to patrol the city with but four men, the chief of police stated this morning that he was unable to tell. He stated that four men couldn't do the work and that it will be up to the council to appoint specials upon every special public occasion.

Officers Welch and Stanton

hearing of the action of the chief and the committee last night, turned in their stars immediately and quit the jobs. Those remaining on the force are, besides the chief, White, Gaines and Fisher.

A Raid On Dogs
