SCHOOL BOARD HOLDS ITS REGULAR MEETING

At the regular meeting of the Salem school board last night Miss Maud Davis, who has been a teacher in the high school for several years, was appointed to take charge of the department of English in the high school. Miss Davis takes the place of Miss Gregory, who resigned recently.

MANY APPLICATIONS FOR SUPERINTENDENCY

The school board is being swamped with applications for the offices of superintendent of schools and principal of the high school. About forty applicants have made known their desire for the appointment to the superintendency, and over thirty applications have been received for principal. The board went over and considered the many applications last night but did not pass upon any of them.

Contractor Who Built Grandstand Will Put New Posts Under Structure

The board last night heard W. H. Dalrymple, the contractor who erected the high school grandstand, and whose claim was held up at an adjourned meeting last week on the grounds the work has not been completed. The members of the board contended that Mr. Dalrymple should not be paid for his work for the reason he failed to fulfill his contract by placing smaller posts under the grandstand that was specified. Dalrymple informed the directors that he will remedy the defect and the board assured the contractor that as soon as he did the contract price would be paid immediately. The matter was finally settled after much discussion.

Heating Plants Up

The directors practically decided last night that if A. L. Fraser, the contractor, who installed several heating plants in the Salem schools, will submit his personal agreement in writing to repair any defects in the plans which might occur when the weather is such as to give them a thorough test, he will be paid the remaining \$300 on the contract.

Senator Lodge

Senator Lodge's proposed substitute for the resolution's preamble set forth "that the state of unrest, violence and anarchy which exists in Mexico, the numerous unchecked and unpunished murders of American citizens and the spoliation of their property in that country; the impossibility of securing protection or redress by diplomatic methods in the absence of lawful or effective authority; the inability of Mexico to discharge its international obligations, the unprovoked insults and indignities inflicted upon the flag and the uniform of the United States by the armed forces in occupation of large parts of Mexican territory, have become intolerable, and that the self respect and dignity of the United States and the duty to protect its citizens and its international right require that such a course be followed in Mexico by our government as to compel respect and observance of its rights."

The trial of the case of the State of Oregon against Fred Dodd, who is charged with a criminal assault on the person of Mrs. George Swanson, occupied the attention of the circuit court for Marion county this morning. At 11 o'clock Mrs. Swanson, the complaining witness, was being cross-examined by the counsel for the defense. She told practically the same story she related in Justice Webster's court at the preliminary hearing. Fred Dodd, the defendant, will go on the stand in his own defense this afternoon.

Paul Schmidt and wife, who were married in this city recently, are now in San Francisco, after spending a few days visiting in the orange belt, and the principal show points near Los Angeles and Loma Linda. Mr. Schmidt speaks highly of California, but declares in a postal received from him by The Capital Journal, that the weather in the south is a little too warm to be really comfortable. In other words, he is partial to Salem, and hopes to be back before long. Mrs. Schmidt sends best regards to all her local friends.

Thanks to the rain, fishermen in Salem are going to have some fine fishing next Sunday. That is, unless the rain maker gets funny and goes to kicking over the big water barrel just at the last minute. Local anglers are getting prepared for the big day, and many early birds will be seen next Sunday morning, weather permitting. The trout streams in this vicinity are getting down to about the proper stage and the water has cleared up within the past two days. Spoon hooks seem to be the favorite so far, but several of the luck sports are laying in a supply of salmon eggs.

With a badly wounded shoulder, which he said was caused by a Mexican bullet near Sonora, Jack King, a man 33 years of age, was here yesterday for a short time. He stated he was a near victim of the Mexican federales several months ago. King declares that he and a man by the name of Watson went to Mexico some time ago for the purpose of mining, and after striking it rich King says Watson handed him a raw deal by telling certain Mexican federal authorities that he was smuggling arms to the revolutionists. He stated that the federales caught him and sentenced him to be shot, but that he escaped and succeeded in eluding his pursuers after being shot in the shoulder. King states that he made his way

to the border on a freight train and was assisted by American soldiers in Texas.

A light frost occurred last night, following an abrupt fall in temperature. This morning a north wind prevailed and farmers and fruit growers are getting snugly ready in anticipation of a cold snap. Strawberries are in greatest danger as cherries and peaches are well set and it would require very low temperatures to seriously injure them, and in the case of strawberries only the blossoms now open would be affected and others would quickly replace them, making the shortage slight.

Rev. John Oval, pastor of the Swedish Methodist church of Salem, was busy this morning in the promotion department of the Commercial club writing letters in answer to communications received by him concerning Salem and vicinity. The letters come from all parts of the United States and inquired about business chances in the city and country. He answers the communications personally and works in harmony with the Commercial club in giving information.

Robert McDaniel and son, Hubert, two Omaha, Neb., farmers, arrived in Salem over the Oregon Electric this morning, and will spend the remainder of the week looking over the agricultural district in Marion county. Mr. McDaniel's wife and two daughters are still in the east, but will start for Oregon just as soon as a location is found by the visitors. Mr. McDaniel and his son like Oregon very much, Salem and vicinity especially, and hope to find something suitable in the way of farm land within a short time.

Albert Cuffner, the youth who was arrested last Saturday on the charge of disorderly conduct by assaulting another boy, Ralph Yoho, in East Salem, was fined \$5 by Judge Elgin in the police court this morning. Young Cuffner appeared yesterday morning to answer to the charge, but Judge Elgin postponed the hearing until this morning, and asked the boy to produce witnesses. Cuffner, along with his mother and three witnesses, appeared today and told their stories. It developed that Cuffner had struck young Yoho first, and the court decided that the former was at fault and punished him accordingly. The boy's mother said that Yoho was just as much to blame as her son, and did not believe that the judgment was fair. Judge Elgin held, however, that Cuffner was the aggressor, and should be held responsible for his acts.

SEVEN DAYS NEEDED SAYS GOVERNOR LISTER Seattle, Wash., April 21.—Within seven days after a call to arms is received the National Guard of Washington will be ready to proceed to Mexico, or anywhere in the world, according to a statement last night by Governor Lister.

"In my opinion, the Second Washington regiment will compare favorably with the militia from any other state, and it will certainly be the best trained and equipped regiment the state has ever sent out," said the governor.

EUGENE COMPANIES READY TO TAKE FIELD IF NEEDED Eugene, Or., April 21.—"My command of eight companies is ready to respond to any call by the president or the governor, and could be mobilized at Clackamas within 48 hours," declared Colonel Creel Hammond, commanding officer of the Oregon artillery corps today.
