"Don't wait until the order to move for the mobilization camp at Clackamas but ealist every man possible immediatedly, 2 declared Colonel Martin, commanding the Third regiment, O. N. G.,

this morning in a telephone message to Major Carle Abrams, commanding the Third battalion of the Third regiment. the headquarters of which are at the Colonel Martin informed Major Ab-

rams that he expected the Oregon troops would receive the first order to troops would receive the first order to move Saturday when they would be mobilized at the state camp at Checka-mas, 12 miles out of Portland. The major said that Colonel Martin urged upon him the necessity of calisting men at once and to pay no attention to uniforms or equipment, but drill the recruits in civilian clothes. The colonel said that the men would be supplied with uniforms and equipment upon arrival at Clackamas.

Major Abrams was in close communicution with his companies yesterday afternoon and expected reports concerning strength and equipment today. The Dallas company reported an enlisted strength of 66 men, Corvallis 65 men, Woodburn 70, and Salem 62, with about 15 waiting the actual call before callisting. Three doctors, two from Salem
