Portland, May 7.—W. S. U'Ren, already an independent candidate for governor, today has the endorsement of the state convention of the Prohibition party which adjourned here last night after a two days' session.

Luther J. Chapin, Marion county agriculturist, has issued a call to farmers about the county who are interested in potato growing to meet at the commercial club in this city, Saturday, at 2 o'clock, for the formation of a "Burbank club." It is the aim of the promoters of this club to secure a pure strain of potato to be developed in this county in order to replace the prestige lost with the California seed potato buyers, who have discontinued taking Oregon potatoes on account of disease.

Additional registration lists were received at the secretary of state's office this morning. There were about 3,000 names in all, and they came from Klamath, Tillamook and Josephine counties, which are thought to be complete; and from Clackamas, Marion and Lincoln, which are only part of the list. The office will be sending out the pamphlets as fast as names are received, and until such time that it would be too late for them to reach the voters.

A. M. Grilley, of the Portland Y. M. C. A., wrote to Oscar Gingrich, physical director of the Salem association, requesting on behalf of the Harrier's club, that the date of the annual Portland-Salem relay be changed from May 30 to a later date on account of the fact that the Portland men would not be able to get out on that date. Physical Director Gingrich was of the opinion that the Salem association would concede the point and that the date of the race would be either June 6 or 13, depending upon the status of the weather.
