CHASING OROZCO BY AUTO

SECRET SERVICE AGENTS AFTER MEXICAN LEADER WHO IS BELIEVED TO CARRY AMMUNITION.

Los Angeles, May 13.—Search for Pascual Orozco, Huertista agent and former Mexican rebel leader, was in progress here today. Orozco is wanted at El Paso to answer to a charge of violating the neutrality laws.

Secret service agents who traced the Mexican to Los Angeles were reported late yesterday to be trailing him in automobiles toward the Mexican border.

It was said also that Orozco was carrying with him a quantity of ammunition. It became known today that the search for the fugitive in Los Angeles is being continued. Federal officials still refused to discuss the case, however.

FLOOD DAMAGE ESTIMATED TO BE ABOUT \$1,000,000

Detroit, Mich., May 13.—Two persons were known to be dead today as a result of floods following two days of rainfall. Hundreds of families living in Detroit suburbs are homeless and thousands of others are crowded in their homes.

The flood damage throughout Michigan is estimated at \$1,000,000. The Ford automobile plant here was flooded.

BELL-RINGING STUNT STUMPS CHIEF OF POLICE SNEDECK

When Chief of Police Snedeck arrived at his office this morning he found the following note on his desk which was left by the night man: "Chief—There is a man living on North Sixth street who says his next door neighbor has got a cherry tree that is full of cherries and that there is five in the family. The members of the family take turns at ringing a cowbell during the day to scare the birds away so they won't carry the cherries off. He says they commence ringing that bell at 5 o'clock in the morning and keep it up all day. He wants to know if there is not some way to put a stop to that." The chief is stumped. He states that the bell-ringing stunt might come under the

GETTING READY FOR WORK

CONTRACT LET FOR STEAM COILS FOR SALEM FRUIT EVAPORATING COMPANY TO BARR.

The contract was let yesterday for the steam coils in the plant of the Salem Fruit Evaporating company in West Salem to T. M. Barr. The fittings and materials have been ordered from Chicago and will be installed in the plant immediately upon their arrival in Salem. The plant in West Salem will have a capacity of ten tons of prunes daily and the output of other

fruits will vary according to varying conditions of evaporation.

The building of the plant has been erected and next week a crew of men will start on the inside finishing and other work in preparation for the finishing of the plant in time for the beginning of the fruit drying season. The plant is modeled after the plant in Kelso, Washington, which last year, in addition to the fruit, branched out and dried 100 tons of smelt. The fish market was glutted for a short time, but the entire output has been disposed of to an advantage and the Kelso plant is now upon a paying basis. The heat from the steam coils is drawn through the trays of fruit by a side draught from powerful fans and the heavy air is never permitted to settle back upon the fruit and no reabsorption of moisture is possible.

The company is incorporated for \$20,000, and the officers are: F. W. Waters, president; George Frazure, vice-president; and Ernest Blue, secretary-treasurer. The other members of the board of directors are: W. J. Patterson, Charles A. Park, Frank Gibson and John Simons.

LATE YESTERDAY.

At Washington.—The senate naval committee restored to the naval appropriation bill the \$50,000 six-year annual allowance for a drydock at Hunter's Point, San Francisco.
