MILLION CARTRIDGES REPORTED CAPTURED RECENTLY

U. S. S. California, Mazatlan, Mex., May 13.—(By wireless to San Diego.)—Important constitutionalist victories are reported here today by rebel commanders. General Gonzales, of the constitutionalist forces, announced that his men had taken General Arzamendi and a large quantity of ammunition in the state of San Luis Potosi.

General Obregon reports that 1,000 federals and a million cartridges were captured at Acapulco.

BANKERS DECLARE FOR RESERVE INSTITUTIONS

No Opposition to the Specific Recommendation for a Branch Bank at Seattle—Spokane Dropped.

WILL OBSERVE FULLY FEDERAL RESERVE LAW

Representatives of 17 Clearing Houses from Five States Met in Chamber of Commerce in San Francisco.

San Francisco, May 13.—A resolution adopted here by a convention of bankers from all parts of California and other Pacific coast states provides that after the establishment of the federal reserve bank in San Francisco branches shall be established in Seattle, Portland, Salt Lake City and Los Angeles. It was announced today that there was no opposition to the specific recommendation of a branch bank at Seattle, but a vote taken on a motion including Spokane resulted in the dropping of the latter city.

The bankers met yesterday in the chamber of commerce building, and throughout the proceedings the desire to observe fully the provisions of the federal reserve law was expressed. It was also unanimously voted that directors in the reserve bank at San Francisco, other than active officials, shall receive no salary beyond the customary fees and traveling expenses provided by law.

The convention was attended by 49 delegates, representing 17 clearing house cities in five of the seven states in the twelfth district. The delegates voted unanimously to have all Class A directors (bankers) elected from a zone including San Francisco and points within six hours journey, and with practical unanimity to have Class B directors (business men) from the same zone.

The delegates decided not to recommend candidates for either class, but to empower the member banks in San Francisco and within six hours journey to make such recommendations of candidates residing in the designated zone.
