WILL DIE ON PALACE STEPS

KING WILL NOT FLEE COUNTRY.

William of Wied Succeeds in Beating Off Rebels From City of Durazzo—Enemy Is Re-Organizing Forces.

Vienna, June 18.—"Rather than flee I'll die sword in hand on the palace steps," William of Wied, Albania's new king, was quoted in a Durazzo dispatch received here today, as declaring.

William, however, has already once taken refuge on an Italian warship in Durazzo harbor and the general opinion in Vienna was that his reign will not last much longer. He was said to have declined to board the same ship again but it was unnecessary for him to do so, his forces having succeeded in beating off the rebel attack on Durazzo Wednesday. In the meantime the rebels were reported to be reorganizing, preparatory to a fresh attempt to take the city.

Making Last Stand.

Rome, June 18.—The rebels attacked Durazzo again today, according to a wireless message from a warship in the harbor there. The forces under William of Wied, the new king of Albania, were said to be making a last stand in the trenches in the city's outskirts. William's defeat was considered inevitable. It was considered certain that he would get safely on board one of the warships but grave fears were felt that the force of bluejackets and marines available was insufficient to prevent looting and perhaps a massacre by the rebels.

STEAMERS CRASH IN CHANNEL.

Cowes, Isle of Wight, June 18.—The British coasting steamer Copwood put in here today with a gaping hole in its side above the waterline, the result of a collision in a fog near Over's lightship in the channel Wednesday night with an unidentified Hamburg-American liner.

It was owing to the density of the fog, the captain said, that he was unable to make out the other vessel's name. His own ship is of only 600 tons and the liner was much larger, he felt sure it was not much damaged. The Copwood was making half speed, it was explained, when the liner loomed up dead ahead and the two vessels crashed an instant later.
