\$8.75 IS WAGE MINIMUM FOR WOMEN IN BRUSH INDUSTRY

Boston, June 22.—A minimum wage of \$8.75 a week for women in the brush industry of Massachusetts was agreed upon today, following an investigation by the state minimum wage commission. The commission found that one-fifth of the girls employed in making brushes received less than \$4, two-fifths received less than \$5 and two-thirds received less than \$6 a week.
