Late Yesterday

Honolulu.—The liner Sierra from San Francisco arrived 12 hours late owing to the loss of its starboard propeller.

Tokio.—Word was received that Governor General Count Sakuma of Formosa had been badly wounded in a fight with insurgents.

Madrid.—A mob of women sacked all the bakeries on account of an increase in the price of bread.

Havana.—The house of representatives appropriated \$17,000,000 to build a new capital.

Toulon, France.—The military dirigible Adjutant Cincinat, with eight passengers, made a flight of 35 hours and 20 minutes, a duration record for dirigibles.

Washington.—Suffragists asserted Secretary Bryan has promised to support equal rights in Nebraska as well as a federal constitutional amendment giving the vote to women.

Washington.—The house passed a bill repealing the law against payment of claims by supporters of the confederacy, opening the way for claims aggregating \$145,000,000.

Hammondsport, N. Y.—The "American", Rodman Wanamaker's trans-Atlantic flyer, made an ascent with 10 passengers weighing 1841 pounds, a weight record for hydro-aeroplanes.

San Francisco.—The site for the Pennsylvania building at the 1915 fair was cleared.

London.—James B. Duke, the first to be 94, was sued to compel \$5,000,000 in a fertilizer company.

San Francisco.—Fifteen hundred men last night took part in a "transportation" in the Ferry building.

Geneva.—Theodore Charles J. Colten and 10 others were indicted with \$5,000,000 in bonds of fraud in connection with the Panama canal project, but never will be prosecuted and repatriated.

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MANUFACTURERS

For the first time in 56 years Salem will have a manufacturers exhibition at the coming State fair. The entire second floor of the new main building will be given over to these exhibits. It will be a state representation of manufacturers. G. W. Stubblebine, of Portland, has been in this city for several days and is enthusiastic over the ready co-operation of the Salem people. The exhibition will prove a boost for home industry. According to the present plan, there will be 87 exhibits in the pavilion and the overflow will be taken care of in a tent. So far, 10 Salem merchant manufacturers have pledged exhibitions.

Particularly interesting will be the working exhibits. A Salem glove factory will make gloves. A miniature newspaper will have its news printed and circulated among the people as they look on. The Salem Iron Works will demonstrate their centrifugal pump by pumping water into a five-hundred-gallon tank.

There will be many ways of creating interest in these working exhibitions. It will mean much to Salem people. Mr. Stubblebine says he was amazed even at the present Salem industry. One local manufacturer has a payroll of 23 people. Salem manufacturers who win recognition at the local State fair will have their exhibitions taken to Portland to compete for cash prizes. October 23 to November 4 in Portland at the armory there will be a manufacturers and land products exhibition. These exhibitions later will be confiscated and held in cold storage ready to be shipped to San Francisco for the Panama exhibition where Oregon products will be shown at the Oregon building.

Application for space at the manufacturers exhibition locally can be made to Frank Meridith, secretary of the Salem State fair board.
