Newport, Cool and Breezy, Draws Visitors From Cities

By Lamar Tooze. Newport, Ore., June 28.—Newport will celebrate the Fourth of July this year. Although it has become almost an established custom for this city to annually observe the nation's birthday, yet this year's celebration promises to outdo all others. Beginning Friday morning, the first day of the celebration, with foot races a feature dance by Indians from the Siletz reservation at Nye Beach, and culminating Saturday night with a grand street carnival and fun-making parade on Front street, the program for the two days will be replete with novel and interesting features.

last year and drew much attention from beach visitors who had never witnessed it before. The feather dance is original with the Siletz Indians, not being practiced by any other tribe. The dancers will be clad in suits of buckskin, will wear brightly-colored feathers and beads and will paint their faces in true Indian style. Friday afternoon the annual Siletz Newport baseball game will be played at the ball grounds. The game will be called at 2 o'clock. In the evening the illuminated boat parade on the bay will be of much interest. Twenty or 30 decorated and brightly illuminated boats and barges will move up the bay toward Yaquina in regular order, closing the first day's celebration. The second day's festivities will be opened with horse races on the beach near the natorium at 9 a. m. Beginning at 10 o'clock, formal exercises will be held at the Newport opera house. Listed on the program is the reading of the Declaration of Independence, the Fourth of July oration and the singing of patriotic music by a special quartet. Saturday afternoon on Yaquina bay will be held the boat and swimming races followed by an exhibition drill by the United States lifesaving crew stationed here. At 4:30 the three hose companies of the Newport fire department will participate in a hose contest on Front street. A prize of \$15 will be awarded the winners. All of the companies have been practicing daily for the past two weeks and a keen contest is assured. Commencing at 8:30 Saturday evening, the two days' demonstrations will be closed by a grand street and fun-making parade on Front street. Music will be furnished throughout the celebration by the Newport band. The two days' Fourth of July celebration, however, will not conclude the festivities here. Beginning Monday, July 6, and continuing for a week, the annual convention of the State Druggists' association will be held here. Special entertainment has been arranged for the visiting pharmacists. Since last summer the railway facilities between this city and Albany over the Corvallis & Eastern have been

greatly improved, the time for the trip being reduced by one hour. The road-bed between Yaquina and Corvallis has been more heavily ballasted, curves have been reduced, bridges built and repaired and heavier rails laid. The steamer Newport now makes the trip across the bay in much less time than formerly through the substitution of gas engines for her old steam-driven machinery. The new train schedule, giving Newport two trains a day, has gone into effect and makes this resort more accessible to people from the valley-cities who can spend but a short time at the seashore.
