"It Is Easier" HOSTETTER'S STOMACH BITTERS AN ANARCHIST PLOT STOPS THE EMPEROR

Rumor of Plot Causes the Emperor to Abandon Plan to Attend Funeral of Archduke Francis Ferdinand.

Berlin, July 2.—Rumors that discovery of an anarchist plot caused Emperor William to abandon his plan to attend the funeral of the late Archduke Francis Ferdinand of Austria and his wife were current here today.

At any rate, he did not go to Vienna as it had been announced he intended to do. It was believed the trip would have been abandoned only for the gravest reasons.

The official explanation was that Emperor Francis Joseph's health was too feeble to make it advisable for him to entertain a visiting monarch. The fact is, said persons in touch with the Austrian court, that Francis Joseph is quite well at present.

A semi-official announcement was also made that the German emperor, who has been suffering from lumbago, was worse.

Prince Henry of Prussia was designated to represent him at the funeral.

RIVER AND HARBOR BILL MAY NOT PASS

Senators Borah and Others Start Filibuster Which May Result in Hanging It Up for the Season.

Washington, July 2.—Friends of the rivers and harbors bill were somewhat afraid today that the measure would not pass at this session of congress. Senator Works said it would, but others among its supporters were not so confident, so seriously was the filibuster inaugurated by Senators Borah, Burton and sympathizers with them delaying matters.

There was a brisk debate late yesterday over the Sacramento and Feather river appropriations. Senator Burton contended that both were for reclamation projects, which should not be included in a bill providing for navigation improvements.

Works answered warmly that California was putting up two thirds of the total sum needed, that the reclamation features of the plan were essential to the improvement of navigation, and that so far as the government's money was concerned, not a cent would be used except for these latter improvements.

ADAMSON DAM BILL TO PASS

Washington, July 2.—A compromise reached last night by democratic leaders today was believed to assure the passage either this afternoon or tomorrow of the Adamson dam and bridge bill. As amended last night the bill divides the jurisdiction over obstructions on navigable rivers between the state and interior departments. The compromise was suggested by President Wilson.

MORGAN AND OTHERS VISIT THE PRESIDENT

Complaint That Business Men Cannot Approach President Wilson Causes Him to Remove the Bars.

Washington, July 2.—J. P. Morgan visited the White House today.

It was admitted that while the primary purpose of his visit was to pay his respects to President Wilson, the real reason was that he might discuss business conditions. Henry Ford, the millionaire automobile manufacturer of Detroit, will call next week and other big business men will confer with the president later, according to intimations given out today.

President Wilson has been criticised on the ground that he has been inaccessible to business men. It was stated on high authority that this is to be changed. It was explained that the president has been unable to see them because his time has been entirely taken up with the administration's program.

It was announced that Morgan personally sought an appointment with the president while Ford had been invited to call at the White House.

During the consideration of the currency bill last summer, Henry Davison and Frank Vanderlip asked for an appointment. The president declined to see them at that time, his friends asserting that he would "not tolerate any Wall Street interference with the administration's legislative program."

WEALTHY WOMAN DISAPPEARS

Chicago, July 2.—The police today were seeking Mrs. Bessie McKeehan, wife of B. L. McKeehan, a wealthy stockman of Imperial, Cal. On June 24th Mrs. McKeehan mailed a postal to her husband telling of her safe arrival here. Then she disappeared.

Mrs. McKeehan had \$1,000 in cash and \$500 worth of jewelry when she left her home June 19 to visit relatives in Indiana.

numbered among the population, and they were the old and decrepit and the adolescent young. While many, many maidens lost brothers and sweethearts and will have to travel lonely down the pathway of life.

Average Man Bears Burden.

"And it is the common man who bears the burden of war," declared Dr. Green. "It is the common man who pays the war tax, who carries the flag, who beats the drum, who fires the rifle, and who dies on the battle field while the men who reap the reward sail away in summy seas on their private yachts or loll in their sumptuous apartments far from the heat of the conflict."

"Why, here in Oregon you men are paying two times as much taxes as needed in order that some other man who has wealth may escape taxation."

"Behind the scenes, behind the moving figures that shout and prate of patriotism, there is little of the true patriotic spirit. Why, in Washington city today there is an organization of men who are keeping close tab on the sentimental nerve of the people of the United States and frequently rasping it as with a piece of sandpaper to get it to such a state of excitation that in a wave of indignation at fancied wrongs the populace will demand armed intervention in Mexico."

"And what is the reason behind it all? Exploitation follows intervention, and Mexico is one of the richest countries on the face of the globe with its wealth practically untouched."

His Trolley Off Here.

"Why are American forces in Mexico now? No one can really say, and no one can tell what is going to happen. We got there by a series of pitiful mistakes and blunders on the part of the administration statesmanship."

"But the world around, the common man is beginning to find himself and beginning to say to those who make war materials and who promote conflict: 'You may go ahead, gentlemen, and start a war, but I am not going to fight your battles for you. You can face the cannon's mouth yourself. I am done with fighting.'

"The enfranchisement of woman is one of the causes of this transformation, this awakening. I expect soon to see a woman as governor of one of our states, but I never expect to see a woman as major general of one of our armies."

The first part of the program was given over to the Hahn Jubilee Singers, and they entertained the audience in an excellent manner. They were full of laughter-provoking stunts and made the time pass rapidly. W. H. Head was in charge of the afternoon program and gave an interesting lecture.
