Stock poisoned by Menziesia exhibit symptoms much like those caused by a number of other plants. There is a noticeable frothing at the month and weakness which causes staggering in the gait and ends in more or less complete paralysis. There is usually pronounced nausea and some times difficulty in breathing. It is believed, however, that a considerable quantity of the plant must be eaten before its effects become dangerous.

Where there is abundance of other fodder sheep will not eat Menziesia. The trouble occurs when there is no other foder readily available. Thus when sheep are driven rapidly along narrow trails—where the plant is most likely to abound—they are apt to seize upon it and this is also true when eding grounds are used repeatedly and the healthy forage in the neighborhood consequently exhausted.
