The Sacred Heart choir furnished music during the evening, and Miss Anna C. Schaefer, of Eugene, was heard in a solo.

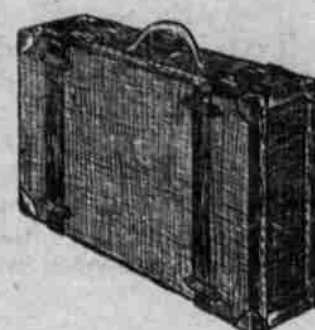

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VICTIMS OF ACCIDENT WILL BOTH RECOVER

Reported dead but still living and with chances good for recovery in the latest news concerning the trainmen who were in the broken bridge accident Friday near Blackrock.

C. H. Faulkner, the engineer, who with his wife and 2-year-old daughter lived on Church street in this city is in the Dallas hospital. His condition is not critical although the bones of both legs are broken and one has a compound fracture below the knee. Joe Fritz, fireman, in Dallas hospital, is suffering from burns on his back and legs from neck to heels. His face is badly burned and skin grafting will probably have to be done on his left arm and hand.

According to reports of the accident in which freight train 239 of the Salem, Falls City & Western, bound for Salem, crashed through the bridge over the Luckiamute Friday, near Blackrock. The engineer sighted the danger. The engine got across safely but the tender dropped and drew the engine crashing down twelve feet. In the fall the steam pipe broke. The fireman was caught and held in the escaping steam, but the engineer jumped landing in the water and escaping from the scalding steam.

The bridge that broke was near the "Y" at Blackrock. A passenger train had crossed the bridge an hour before, but when the freight run on it, it gave way and the engine crashed down, turned over and stood up on one end. The Dallas passenger bound for Blackrock was soon on the scene and physicians were called from Falls City and Dallas. Dr. A. B. Starbuck in Falls City at the time made the run in 45 minutes. The injured men will probably be in the hospital for some months.
