Residents of South Salem are complaining of the shortage of water there. Several have reported that they are almost entirely without a water supply from 5 o'clock in the morning to 9 o'clock in the evening, although they are forced to pay the regular rates for the service.

E. O. Siecke, deputy State Forester, returned from Norfolk, Neb., today where he visited his mother, Mrs. C. L. Siecke for several days. Mrs. Siecke was seriously ill when her son arrived in Norfolk, but her condition was much improved when he left. "It was sure enough hot back there," said Mr. Siecke. "Crops, however, are fine and everybody is happy. I have been in Oregon six years, and I hardly realized what a fine climate we have until I experienced the hot weather on my trip. I certainly was glad to get back where the nights are cool and the days none too warm."

Miss Fern Hobbs, private secretary to Governor West, received a letter today from the executive, who is delivering lectures and visiting penal institutions in the East. The governor wrote from St. Mary's, West Virginia. He said he had visited a convict camp there, and that his trip had more than paid for itself in information he had received regarding penal and other reformatory institutions. He said before leaving Salem that it was his desire to get as much information as possible regarding the employment of convicts indoors, it being his belief that it would not be long before such employment would be necessary for Oregon convicts. Governor West wrote that he was having a good time, but was suffering some as a result of the intense heat.

Simon Benson, of Portland, timberman, hotel owner and good roads enthusiast, will confer with the State Highway Commission today regarding the proposed \$75,000 bond issue in Hood River County for the building of the stretch of the Pacific Highway in that county. Mr. Benson is positive the issue will be approved, and has given the county commissioners his guaranty that \$75,000 will do the work. He has promised to donate the difference in case the bond issue should be insufficient. Mr. Benson desires to discuss with the board the details of the proposed work.

"Canned" music will be more popular in Oregon in the future than ever before, if a ruling announced today by the State Railroad Commission is correctly interpreted. George C. Will & Co., of Salem, complained sometime ago that the rates for shipping perforated records, such as are used in pianolas and piano players were too high. Commissioner Atchison laid the facts before the Western Classification Commission, in session in Seattle last week, with the result that it ordered a reduction of one-third in the rate. The old rate was one and one-half times first class and the new one is first class.

The City of Marshfield today filed with the State Railroad Commission objection to a petition of the Coos Bay Water Company that it be allowed an extension of time to complete improvements on its reservoir and mains ordered by the commission. It was ordered that the work be done by August 1 and a scale of rates somewhat lower than the old one be adopted. The company has asked a modification of the order as it applies to meter rates, declaring that they are too low to make

them profitable. The new scale becomes effective when the improvements to the plant are completed.

Mr. Alexander Meyers, of Sumner, Washington, and Miss Helen Hoffman, were married at St. Joseph's rectory yesterday by Rev. Father Moore. They left on the 9:45 a. m. Oregon Electric for Sumner, where they will permanently reside.

The Ladies Aid Society of Jason Lee M. E. church on North Winter street, will give an ice cream social at the church Tuesday evening, beginning at 8 o'clock, to which all are invited.

Ralph Moores, secretary of the commercial club has issued a circular letter which he is sending to about 30 commercial clubs in the northwest to secure a report of conditions and the progress of the various clubs. A list of questions is sent to each club which will give the information desired and will also, Mr. Moores believes, build for closer relations among the boosting bodies of the various cities.

The White House restaurant is replacing its old-style lighting system with the latest development in the way of commercial illumination. Three of the new "nitrogen" electric light lamps, each with a rating of 670 candlepower, will give an abundance of pure white light. They are being installed by the Salem Electric Co., which was lately finished putting in one of the same-sized lamps in the lobby of the Globe theatre. They have also placed two lamps of 1700 candlepower each in front of the Gray Belle.

The State Pharmaceutical Society of Oregon is holding its quarterly examinations at Newport today and tomorrow. Salem aspirants for the title of registered druggists who are taking the examinations are Miss Ruby Baker, Gustav Taw and Stacey Reeves, F. S. Ward, a local druggist is on the examining board.

A test case of the Blue Sky law was filed today in the circuit court of Marion county. The suit is brought against Attorney General Crawford and Corporation Commissioner Ralph Watson by William E. Davidson, of Portland. Davidson is a stock broker of Portland and claims damages to the extent of \$2,000. The real purpose of the case is to test the constitutionality of the law in the supreme court of the state. Attorney L. B. Mahone, who is representing the plaintiff, has raised thirteen points questioning the constitutionality of the law. It was largely to this county as the Multnomah county courts claimed to have no jurisdiction over the matter.

Dashing into a high fence, a machine belonging to George H. Ball of Balkstone, Ore., narrowly escaped a serious accident at South Thirteenth street and the city limits Sunday afternoon. Spectators saw the big Hupp mobile whizzing down the country road from the direction of the Home for the Feeble Minded to make the turn onto the short road toward Twelfth street. Instead, in a cloud of dust, it sprang straight ahead into a woven wire fence. The fence sprung back several feet, holding the car. People ran from all directions, ready to assist, but found that the fence had held firmly, only smashing the front wheel of the car. In the end, with Mr. Ball was Miss Eunice Craig, daughter of F. Sumpter Craig, editor of the Pacific Homestead. The young people left the car piled up in a heap and boarded a car for the city.

The report of the appraisers in the matter of the assignment of C. F. Young, an insolvent debtor, who formerly conducted a grocery store under the name of Young & Company in this city, was filed today. The fixtures were appraised at \$2,500.16

The funeral services of C. O. Brown, for many years a resident of Salem, were held from the family residence at 400 North Twenty-first street Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Rev. Perry F. Schrock officiated and Miss Bonnell sang "Jesus Savior Pilot Me." Interment was in City View cemetery. The pallbearers were T. J. Clark, E. S. Conter, R. Vanderbilt, A. B. Curtis, John Simmons and George Harris.

The rounding up of the special revenue of 10 jurymen to be used in the case of the state against Albert Quarter took up the forenoon and they were not brought to the court room until 2 o'clock this afternoon. Sheriff Esch found the farmers busy in the hay fields and with the present prospect of rain all were putting in extra time to care for their crops. He took an auto, however, and loaded them in as soon as he located them and carried them off to court.

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TO TAKE UP QUESTION OF THE STEEL BRIDGE

County Courts and City Council to Meet to Take Action on It—Would Stop Salem Getting Anp Drier.

The condition of the steel wagon bridge across the river at this city and the means of improving these conditions either by repairs or a new bridge came up for discussion at the meeting of the board of governors of the commercial club today. Major H. L. Bowlby of the state highway commission was present to offer expert testimony on the subject of steel bridges. The consensus of opinion of the members of the board of governors was that the unsafe condition of the bridge has not been exaggerated in the reports that have been offered from time to time. Mr. Bowlby stated that it was often the case where bridges were constructed before autos and auto trucks were heard of that when the additional traffic of motor vehicles was put upon these old bridges they would not stand the strain.

While the bridge will stand up under ordinary light traffic for the present, it is possible an accident may occur at any time and besides a possible loss of life there was the possibility of damages which might amount to more than the cost of repairs or a new bridge.

A Three-party Affair. The upkeep of the bridge is borne jointly by Marion and Polk counties and the city of Salem. Judge Bushey is willing to see that the county does its part and the Polk county court is said to be willing to bear its share of the expense. The city council has not yet been approached upon the subject and Secretary Moores will confer with the street committee within the next few days. There will be a meeting of the parties next Wednesday to confer upon the matter.

The matter of a public hitching post for the use of the farmers who drop into town for a short stay now lies with the street committee. Judge Bushey has granted permission to build a hitching rack 50 feet long under the approach to the steel bridge. From the woodwork under the approach an iron pipe may be hung which will afford room for the hitching of a number of teams. The location is within the city, however, and the matter will be taken up with the street committee.

Want Bank Protected. Secretary Moores was instructed to open communication with Congressman Hawley relative to the reversion work on the west bank of the river opposite this city, as each year's freshets wash out additional land from the bank of the river and it is probable that at some time the city of Salem will be left high and even "drier" than it is now.

The condition of the fairgrounds road came up for discussion. It was pointed out in a communication to the club that whenever there is a rain during fair week the roads to the fair grounds revert to mudholes. Several thousand dollars have been spent on these roads in the past and it has been a continual source of expense. It has been suggested that permanent roads be built and the matter of building permanent roads from the hard surface pavement on North Capital street to the fair grounds will be taken up with the property owners.

A number of smaller matters were disposed of and the meeting adjourned after securing a promise from Major Bowlby to address the next monthly meeting of the commercial club at the Marion on August 12. There were present George Rodgers, president; Ralph Moores, secretary; J. G. Shipley, W. L. Staley, H. L. Bowlby and Hamilton.

The suit for divorce brought by Edna Maeed Rozell against James William Rozell was on in Judge Gallows' department this afternoon. The grounds alleged are cruel and inhuman treatment. Mrs. Rozell testified that her husband called her vile names and accused her of unchastity. She says that he locked her in her rooms and did not provide her with proper food. They were married in Vancouver in 1911.

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
