Transfer of Portland Team to Ballard Makes Northwestern Great Minor League, Says Jones.

### White Sox Lose Chase.

Buffalo, N. Y., July 21.—Hal Chase, the sensational first baseman who jumped the Chicago White Sox to play with the Buffalo Federals, is free to play with the local outlaws as a result of the action today of Justice Herbert Bissell of the supreme court in granting a motion by Chase's attorney to vacate a temporary injunction obtained by organized baseball officials restraining Chase from playing with the Buffalo Federals.

The decision was regarded as the most important victory yet secured by the Federal league in its fight against the American and National leagues. Many other similar cases depended on the outcome of the Chase injunction. As in several other decisions in different cities concerning the ten day clause in organized baseball contracts, Justice Bissell ruled that Chase's contract with the Chicago Americans lacked mutuality. The court denied, however, that the Sherman anti-trust law had been violated, but held that organized baseball is a monopoly of the common law.

### Chip Begins Training.

San Francisco, July 21.—George Chip, of New Castle, Pa., settled down today in his training quarters at San Rafael to prepare for his 20 round bout with Sailor Ed Petroskey here July 31. Accompanied by his manager Jimmy Dime; his brother Joe and Tom McMahon, the Pennsylvania middle weight arrived from Los Angeles by boat and the party went at once to San Rafael. Dime said Chip had been taking it easy in the south, but would not require much work to get him on edge for the Petroskey match.

### They Want Klopfer.

Los Angeles, Cal., July 21.—President Mayor of the Venice Coast league club said today that he had been offered \$21,000 by the Chicago White Sox for Pitcher Ed Klopfer. The Sox want Klopfer to report at once, and Maier claims to have turned down the offer.

### A Great Minor League.

Portland, Ore., July 21.—The transfer of the Portland team to Ballard has made the Northwestern one of the greatest minor leagues in the country, according to President Fielder Jones today. "There are few leagues having such a small radius now that Portland has been eliminated," he said, "and traveling expenses will be reduced very materially."

### Another Match For Chip.

San Francisco, July 21.—Promoter Coffroth was scheduled to see George Chip late today to discuss a match with Mike Gibbons here some time next month. When Gibbons wired his acceptance, Coffroth regarded the match as settled, but meanwhile Chip agreed to box Petroskey, which may interfere with next month's match. If Chip is unavailable as an opponent for Gibbons, Coffroth will go to work on another match, with Billy Murray of Sacraucen as one of the principals.

### SMUGGLING IN CHINESE.

San Francisco, July 21.—From Monterey to Eureka, the customs, immigration and lighthouse services were on the alert today to prevent an expected attempt to land a launchful of contraband Chinese. The launch was said to have left Ensenada, Mexico, with 40 of the Orientals on board and to have been sighted near Monterey. The patrol of the coast was so thorough that federal officials thought a landing would be impossible.

Elliott, was unanimously elected by the school directors last night at their regular board meeting. Clancy will act as instructor in mathematics and general athletic director of the high school during the coming year. He is a graduate of the University of Iowa, comes well recommended in scholastic lines and is a popular football coach. He is enthusiastic over the sport and plays a fast open game.

### BODY OF WOMAN IS FOUND ON THE BEACH

Galveston, Texas, July 21.—With a bullet wound in the head, and half buried in the sand, the body of a handsome woman was found on the beach here today. The police believed the woman was murdered, robbed and that her assassin then dragged her body to the beach, hoping it would be carried away by the tide. There was no clue to her identity. The victim looked to be about 22 years old. The body was clad in white and the underclothing was of the finest. The bullet had gone through a Panama hat the girl wore and completely penetrated the brain. There were no powder marks. An excited, unidentified man was seen last night near the spot near where the corpse was found and the police were looking for him today.

## TYRONE IS NOW THE BONE OF CONTENTION

Is Mostly Catholic But a Few Orange-Men Ask Not to Be Deserted and Ulster Promises to Stand By Them.

Dublin, July 21.—Ireland was anxiously awaiting news today of the London conference between King George and the liberal, conservative and Irish leaders concerning the home rule controversy.

The people have generally expressed themselves as contented with the exemption of Ulster from the authority of an Irish parliament, provided Tyrone is excepted in Ulster. On this question there promised to be grave friction. The population of this county is practically Catholic. The Catholics have all along declared themselves determined to be included under the provisions of the home rule bill and the rest of Ireland has shown its resolve to back them in their demand.

At the same time there are a number of influential Tyrone orangemen who have appealed to their fellow Ulsterites not to desert them. The latter have promised them support to the last ditch. Fears were consequently expressed that the entire population will be deadlocked on the issue of this one county.

## MAY CAUSE ENGLAND PLENTY OF TROUBLE

Anti-English Agitators in India Arousing Intense Feeling Over Barraging Hindus From British Columbia.

Calcutta, British July 21.—The authorities here and elsewhere throughout India were exercising special vigilance today on account of fears of violence developing from the Canadian immigration department's attitude toward the shipment of Hindus detained at Vancouver. Anti-English agitators in India have kept the people well informed concerning the Vancouver situation, embellishing it with hair raising stories concerning the cruelties they declare have been practiced on the immigrants and unquestionably have stirred up intense feeling in connection with the case. If there should be any really serious fighting and especially if any of the Hindus should be killed, well informed officials here said they thought serious outbreaks were quite within the bounds of possibility.

### DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S VIEW ON LIQUOR LAW

Answering a query from a prominent drug firm of Portland District Attorney Evans said that his office would hold that merchants can fill orders for liquor to go into dry precincts which were given at the store and for which cash was paid at the store. He said that he would also hold legal suits in which accounts were carried where orders were given at the store, to solicitors or over the telephone. In both cases he said the store could deliver the liquor to the home of the purchaser as he construed such sales to be consummated at the store and not in the precinct. Mr. Evans said that he had no intention of stopping anyone who desired to question the legality of his opinion and that anyone not in accordance with his opinion could apply to any justice of the peace or district judge for a complaint if he had sufficient evidence to back a charge but that his office could not give such complaints as he felt that courts must construe the law as he had construed it. He said that in cases such as that against Kline Brothers in which liquor was sent "C. O. D." for delivery by an employee of the store, complaints would be issued if evidence showed probable cause.

an hour and then we could see a dense cloud of black smoke rolling toward us. The revenue cutter Patterson came in sight just after we heard the first peals of thunder. Patterson ran alongside and Captain Miller came aboard my ship. When we saw the cloud of smoke approaching Captain Miller returned to the cutter and later wire-lessly that he was going to 'run for it.' The smoke was traveling too fast for us, however, and in a few minutes we found ourselves in total darkness. 'The cloud was filled with fine black sand and the sulphur in the air turned all the paint on the Windeber yellow. Whenever clothing came in contact with the elements it was immediately ruined by the sulphuric gas. About 5 o'clock in the afternoon the cloud be-

gan to lift and the compass again became normal. All the paint on the ship was ruined and the crew has been busy repainting ever since."
