## COMMITTEE AFTER ANOTHER BIG WAD

Will Try to Make Calhoun Show What Became of Nearly \$4,000,000 Missing From the Company's Treasury.

San Francisco, July 22.—When the California state railroad commission resumed, on Tuesday, July 28, its investigation into the United Railroads financial affairs, it was stated today that it will take the trail immediately of the \$3,990,969.59 which the commission's auditor, L. B. Reynolds, announced at Monday's hearing was unaccounted for.

This was quite exclusive of the \$1,996,711.70 which the directors authorized ex-President Calhoun to invest in enterprises independent of the United Railroads and which he did invest in his Solano Farms project, giving in return for it, when Jesse W. Lilienthal succeeded as president, a note which Lilienthal promptly listed on the company's books as worth \$1.

The \$1,996,711.70 was gone from the company's coffers, it was true, but the railroad commissioners knew where and how it went. As to the \$3,990,969.59 they could only guess. They did guess, that it represents the most of graft trials, fighting strikes, and various outside business enterprises but they wanted definite information.

President Lilienthal promised all assistance in his power in tracing down the various items which seemed, according to Reynolds, to have been covered by a complicated system of bookkeeping which it will probably take considerable time to unravel.

KEEP THEM GUESSING.

London, July 22.—Reports that an important militant suffragette demonstration was imminent kept the police on the alert yesterday.

Just what was contemplated was not known, nor did Scotland Yard seem able to trace the rumors to their source. It was presumed, however, that they emanated from the suffragettes themselves, just enough hints having been permitted to leak out to worry the authorities without enabling them to take any definite preventative measures.

The militant leaders were all under close surveillance and wholesale arrests were threatened at the first sign of activity.
