DEER SEASON OPENS ON AUG. 1

—REMAINS OPEN UNTIL OCT. 31

August 1 to October 31, three long months, will be the open season for deer. With the opening day less than two weeks off, not a few sportsmen are shining up the old weapon and are preparing to invade the stronghold of the little creature.

That a splendid season is promised is indicated by the reports from the mountain districts of the state saying that deer were never more plentiful than now.

Only three male deer are permitted to each hunter during the season. Any mutilation of the carcass so as to conceal the sex is a violation of the law. Hunters should remember that they cannot hunt and fish on the same license, but must have both hunters' and anglers' licenses if they wish to engage in both sports.

Will the season pass off quietly without the death of a single hunter? This is the question that is uppermost in the minds of many people. This would not be impossible if the sportsmen would heed the instructions printed upon the license, and wear red garments, that could be distinguished at a distance.

It would be a good thing for every hunter to carefully study the instructions printed on the back of all licenses, whether they have previously studied them or not. To those who have studied them it would serve to refresh their memory. Some mighty good hints are given.

PORTLAND HAS A FIRE

Portland, Ore., July 23.—It was estimated today that the fire which swept two blocks in the east side manufacturing district late Wednesday, destroying eight buildings, did damage amounting to \$100,000. The heaviest losers were the Freeland Furniture company, \$35,000; King-Fisher Mattress company, \$25,000; and Gunther-King Sheet metal works, \$20,000. For a time flying brands threatened surrounding property.

TO HERD AUTOISTS

Portland, Ore., July 23.—Plans are completed today by the municipal bureau of highways and bridges for the placing of a mound three feet thick and five feet high in the center of each street intersection in the business district where there are no car lines, to compel automobiles to make proper turns and eliminate the practice of cutting corners.

WILL OPEN LAND IN UMPQUA FOREST
Roseburg, Ore., July 23.—An order has been received at the Roseburg land office to the effect that 16 sections of land, formerly a part of the Umpqua national forest reserve, will be opened to entry to homesteaders on October 2. Most of the land is heavily timbered and is situated almost directly west of Roseburg on the Coast Range mountains and near the head of Coos river.

The purpose of removing this land from the forest reserve is thought to be to make the reserve more regular and the remaining portions easier to patrol. The land will be open to settlement September 3, and to entry on October 2, although entries may be filed as early as September 12.

The sections of land open to entry are scattered in three townships, 29 to 24, and 26 to 30, inclusive, and 32, 33 and 34 in townships 26-8, section 4, township 27-8, and sections 10 and 14, township 28-9.

RAINS BRING RELIEF.
Chicago, July 23.—Scattered rains in Wisconsin and other sections of the northwest today brought relief from the terrific heat which had prevailed for several days. In the middle west, however, the hot weather continued and no immediate relief was in sight.

At 9 o'clock this morning, the government thermometer here registered 90 degrees and was climbing rapidly. The weather bureau here predicted the temperature would exceed yesterday's high mark of 96 degrees. Cincinnati, Evansville, Memphis, Springfield, Ill.; Kansas City and St. Louis also reported scorching weather again today.

HIS OWN LITTLE EXPOSITION.
San Diego, Cal., July 23.—D. C. Collier, former president of the San Diego Panama-California exposition, president of the Southwestern Pacific and Point Loma railroads, today has on file suit for divorce. His complaint alleges "mental cruelty," and cites the alleged temper suicide threats and derogatory statements of his wife as grounds. Mrs. Collier, on Tuesday, filed suit for separate maintenance, alleging desertion. Mrs. Collier is a sister of Congressman Ira Copley of Illinois.
