CORVALLIS MAN ENDS LIFE WITH BULLET

Z. H. Davis Believed to Be Dug Out From Injuries Received in Auto Accident Fires Bullet Into His Head.

Corvallis, Ore., July 27.—Believed to have been temporarily insane from an injury sustained in an automobile accident a week ago, Z. H. Davis, prominent merchant and city treasurer, shot himself in the mouth at noon today with a .22 calibre rifle.

While conversing with a friend at the door of his place of business, Davis excused himself and went to the rear of the store, where he fired the shot.

Davis was thrown from his automobile a week ago and since then has complained of his head hurting him occasionally.
