Paris, July 28.—Mme. Henriette Caillaux, who killed Editor Gaston Calmette of "Le Figaro," was acquitted here today on a murder charge. Prosecutor Herbaux admitted in his closing argument that there were extenuating circumstances in the prisoner's favor in connection with the case.

WHEAT MARKETS GREATLY EXCITED

New York, July 28.—The market was both active and weak as a result of Austria's declaration of war. Southern Pacific dropped 3-8 and Canadian Pacific 6-34. Southern Railway was off 2-1-8. At 1 o'clock most of the active stocks had recovered a point. Steel was 57-1-8; Union Pacific, 122; and Canadian Pacific, 171. During the noon hour the sales amounted to 200,000 shares. The sale during the same hour yesterday was only 50,000 shares.

FEAR THAT SPARK WILL IGNITE CIVIL WAR OVER HOME RULE



SOLDIERS AFRAID TO LEAVE BARRACKS MOB AWAITS THEM

London, July 28.—Only the fact that it was believed the soldiers would be killed if they ventured from their barracks prevented the immediate withdrawal of the Kings Own Scottish Borderers from Dublin, it was tacitly admitted today in government circles here. Peeling in Ireland against the troops who fired Sunday into a home rule crowd, killing four and wounding about 80, was seemingly growing more and more bitter. Town councils throughout the whole Catholic part of the island were adopting resolutions branding the affair as a massacre and demanding the punishment of everyone concerned in it.

CHINA REVOLUTION BECOMING SERIOUS MAY SPLIT COUNTRY

Shanghai, July 28.—Up-country advices received here today indicated that the revolutionary movement which has just developed in Hunan province is the most formidable President Yuan Shi Kai has yet faced. Leaders of the uprising were said to have been gathering arms and ammunition and assembling veterans of the last revolution for some time. They uncovered their plans so suddenly that the government seems to have been taken completely by surprise.

AUSTRO-SERVIAN WAR DECLARED AND EUROPE TREMBLES

(By Carl H. Von Wiegand.) Berlin, July 28.—Austria was fully prepared for quick work when it declared war against Serbia today. Its troops were massed on the Serbian frontier. Its warships were ready. Its transports were moving on the Danube. Not a detail of preparation for hostilities had been overlooked.

WAR IS DECLARED

London, July 28.—Austria formally declared war against Serbia today, according to dispatches received here from Vienna. This announcement followed Austria's refusal to suspend hostilities pending mediation attempts, as suggested by Foreign Minister Sir Edward Grey of England.

U'REN DECLINES THE PROHIBITION

Portland, Ore., July 28.—All campaign activities at prohibition headquarters in behalf of W. S. U'ren, who was the party's nominee for the office of governor, were stopped today upon the receipt from U'ren of a letter formally declining to accept the nomination because of a provision in the law which prohibits him from running as an independent candidate and also as the candidate of a political organization.

AUSTRIA STANDS PAT

Vienna, July 28.—Austria's military measures and present course cannot be interrupted pending negotiations looking toward mediation. This was Foreign Minister Count Von Berchtold's reply today to the suggestion from Foreign Minister Sir Edward Grey of England that hostilities against Serbia be suspended while England, Germany, France and Italy arranged an ambassadorial conference looking toward the preservation of Europe's peace.

WAR NEWS IN BRIEF

War was declared by Austria against Serbia today. The most strenuous efforts were being made at every old-world capital to prevent the rest of Europe from becoming involved. Strong forces of Austrian troops were massed on the Serbian frontier, more were being hurried to the front and Austrian ships controlled the Danube.

GERMANY REJECTS

It was known positively here that Germany favors localization but intends to take a hand if Russia interferes. It was reported here that Russia had ordered the mobilization of 14 army corps. Unconfirmed rumors were also current of a Russian military concentration on the frontier.

THE Czar IS FIRM

St. Petersburg, July 28.—Despite the war scare the czar left today on his scheduled visit to the Finnish shores. He arranged, however, to keep in the closest touch with St. Petersburg. His majesty was said to have taken personal responsibility for Russia's firm stand in favor of interference if Austria undertook to crush Serbia.

Kaiser Has Accepted

Berlin, July 28.—The kaiser has accepted in principle the suggestion by British Foreign Minister Sir Edward Grey for mediation attempts on the part of England, Germany, France and Italy in the Austro-Serbian quarrel, it was stated here today. It was expected a formal reply to Sir Edward would be made shortly.

THE WASHINGTON CABINET

The Washington cabinet decided the war scare should be neutral in the event of a general European war. Morris Hillquit, the socialist, declared in New York that a general strike would be declared in the European countries where war threatened, rendering hostilities impossible.

EUROPEAN BOURSES PANICKED

European bourses were panicky and quotations in Paris were suspended when it was announced war had been declared. Bad bank runs occurred in Germany and Austria and some banks closed.
