Austrian Crown Prince, Charles Francis Joseph ESTHER MITCHELL SUICIDES AT NEWPORT

Shot and Killed Her Brother at Seattle Who Killed the "Holy Roller," Joshua Creffield-Took Strychnine Route.

Newport, Ore., Aug. 3.-Bringing to an end a series of tragedies which extended over a period of 10 years and resulting from her afailiation with the "Holy Roller" seet, Mrs. James N. Berry, formerly Eather Mitchell, is dead heretoday, a suicide from taking strychnine

In 1906 Mrs. Berry, then Esther Mit-chell, shot and killed her brother, George Mitchell, at Seattle, two days after he had been acquitted on the charge of murder for killing "Joshua" Creffield, head of the "Holy Rollers," because of his futures over her because of his influence over her. Shortly after this Mrs. Maude Hurt Creffield, her sister, and wife of the Holy Roller leader, committed suicide by taking strychnine.

Miss Mitchell was sent to the Stella coom insane asylum but was paroled in 1910. Since then she has lived here quietly. She was married to Berry a few weeks ago.




