

RUSSIAN COSSACK AND GERMAN UHLAN MEET WITH REPULSE

Cossacks Invading Austria Beaten and Fifty Are Captured

CRACK CAVALRYMEN ARE BADLY WHIPPED

Division of Uhlans Driven Back by Fierce Fire of Machine Guns

Berlin, Aug. 3.—Russian Cossacks who had crossed the frontier from Russia into Germany were repulsed today at Johannsburg by the Eleventh Pomeranian dragoons.

A Russian officer and five Cossacks were killed and 11 were captured. Seven Germans were wounded.

German troops have occupied Kalisz, in Russian Poland.

Border skirmishing was reported at several places.

Russians were repulsed Sunday when they attacked the German guard over the railroad bridge which crosses the Warta near Eichenheid.

A Russian detachment of some strength and provided with artillery was operating on German soil near Schwinden, and there were several other points at which the frontier had been violated by the czar's troops.

Further news was anxiously awaited from the commander of the German cruiser Augsburg, who reported Sunday that he was bombarding the Russian Baltic seaport of Libau, which he said was in flames. The town is an important one, and is the site of a Russian naval arsenal.

Uhlans Driven Back.

Paris, Aug. 3.—That overwhelming defeat marked an attempt Sunday by a division of Uhlans, Germany's crack cavalry, to capture Petit Croix, France, was made known here today.

As the Germans advanced the French garrison opened on them with machine guns. The cavalry charged repeatedly but each time was beaten back by a murderous hail of steel-jacketed bullets.

Their final repulse was so complete that they left their dead on the field. Many of them were captured.

Reports of the engagement were current Sunday but no details were known. The Uhlans were the advance of guard of the Germans Metz army. Current report here had it that one fourth of their number were killed or wounded.

The French victory was celebrated here with the wildest enthusiasm.

Further fighting was expected momentarily.

The war office was rushing artillery and infantry toward Longwy with all possible expedition.

Copenhagen, Aug. 3.—Merchants here today confirmed the report that a fleet of German warships was steaming up the Baltic sea toward Russia. The fleet, it was said, consisted of two battleships, four cruisers and several destroyers.

Martial Law Everywhere.

Paris, Aug. 3.—Martial law, as long as the war continues, was proclaimed today throughout France and Algeria.

He was a veteran of the Civil War having been mustered into the United States service at Denver, Colo., on the 22nd day of August, 1864, as a private of Captain William H. Morgan's Company U, Third Regiment Colorado Volunteer Cavalry.

He was promoted to corporal of his company and was constantly with his command during its service.

He received an honorable discharge at Denver, Colo., on the 28th day of December, 1864, by reason of expiration of term of service.

He has lived for the past fourteen years in West Salem, loved and respected by all with whom he associated. Honest and upright, always ready to lend a helping hand he has made many friends and his cheery face and voice will be missed.

He was a member of Sedgwick Post, No. 10, Department of Oregon, Grand Army of the Republic, and was formerly a member of Cester A. Arthur Post No. 47, at Medford, Oregon.

Crown Prince Charles Francis Joseph, next in line to the Austrian throne after the assassination of Archduke Francis Ferdinand, which was the immediate cause of differences between Austria and Serbia, will succeed his great-uncle, Emperor Francis Joseph, on the throne. He will lead a large part of the Austrian army in the crisis.

ESTHER MITCHELL SUICIDES AT NEWPORT

Shot and Killed Her Brother at Seattle Who Killed the 'Holy Roller,' Joshua Creffield—Took Strychnine Route.

Newport, Ore., Aug. 3.—Bringing to an end a series of tragedies which extended over a period of 10 years and resulting from her affiliation with the "Holy Roller" sect, Mrs. James N. Berry, formerly Esther Mitchell, is dead heretoday, a suicide from taking strychnine.

In 1906 Mrs. Berry, then Esther Mitchell, shot and killed her brother, George Mitchell, at Seattle, two days after he had been acquitted on the charge of murder for killing "Joshua" Creffield, head of the "Holy Rollers," because of his influence over her.

Shortly after this Mrs. Maude Hurt Creffield, her sister, and wife of the Holy Roller leader, committed suicide by taking strychnine.

Miss Mitchell was sent to the Steilacoom insane asylum but was paroled in 1910. Since then she has lived here quietly. She was married to Berry a few weeks ago.

MISS BOETTICHER RESIGNS FROM OLD FOLKS' HOME

The 10 members of the old peoples' home on Ferry street were saddened Saturday by the resignation of Miss Ida Boetticher, their matron. Miss Boetticher decided to terminate her work at the home and Saturday the old folks found it hard to say good-bye to their kind friend. Coming from Indiana a year and a half ago, doing work among the sick and aged, Miss Boetticher's ability was recognized locally, and four months ago she accepted supervising duties at the home for the aged, endeavoring herself with the inmates. With Mrs. A. J. Monroe, she will take a much-needed rest shortly at Bay Ocean.

CHIEF DRAWS LINE AT MESSENGER SERVICE

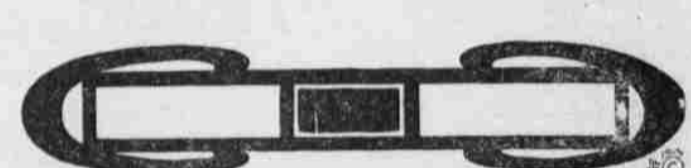
