## Newport, Cool and Breezy, Draws Visitors From Cities

LAMAR TOOZE.

Newport, Ore., August 5, 1914.—Far more marked than ever before is the increasing number of automobile parties that are daily arriving in Newport. From Portland, Seattle, San Francisco and nearly every city in the Willamette valley, automobilists have made the trip to this resort during the season thus far, and, should the prevailing good weather continue, all indications point toward a still further increase during the balance of the season.

The increasing automobile traffic is undoubtedly due to the improvement of the roads in the state—particularly between Newport and Albany. During the past two years highways that were formerly impassable to cars have been graded or macadamized; culverts and bridges have been built; grades considerably reduced and fills made. The Lincoln, Benton and Linn county courts have expended large sums of money in opening up the Newport-Albany road to automobiles, and still further work will be done this year.

Of as much importance to automobilists as the improvement of highways has been the establishment of garages and auto supply houses in nearly every city and village along the 72-mile route. The drive to Newport is replete with beautiful scenery, the route penetrating some of the wildest and most untamed country in Oregon. For miles at a time the road stretches through land that has never been cultivated and is used principally for cattle and sheep ranges. The part of the journey between Toledo and Newport, 13 miles, is of especial scenic interest. The road winds in and around the coast range foothills, sometimes clinging on ledges on the mountainsides, hundreds of feet high, and at other times skirting their bases or following the valleys of the many mountain streams that flow into Yaquina bay.

At the present time automobiles have been arriving in Newport at the rate of from five to 10 a week.
