MUST REPORT FOR DUTY.

San Diego, Calif., Aug. 4.—British naval reservists living in San Diego were notified today by Allen Hutchinson, British vice-consul here, that their government had called on them and that they are to report for duty at once at the local British consulate.

Hutchinson refused to comment upon the latest warlike move on the part of the government he represents. The calling out of the local reservists, was looked upon as significant here, in view of the fact that the British school of war Shearwater left this port yesterday to join the British fleet of war Algerine and Rainbow and the Japanese cruiser Idzuma in the vicinity of Magdalena Bay.
