## GERMANY PROTESTS AGAINST CENSORSHIP

Washington, Aug. 8.—Protest against an alleged American naval censorship of German wireless stations which English and French cables were unmolested was lodged with President Wilson here today by the German-American chamber of commerce.

"The German cable has been cut," the protest said, "and all communications received at the German wireless stations at Sayville, L. I., and Tucker town, N. J., are censored. It is believed that information regarding the movement of German ships has been cabled to England and France and then sent by wireless to French and English warships. Is not this an infringement of neutrality laws and should not the English and French cables be censored?"

## DON'T LOSE YOUR NERVE IF YOU 'SEE THINGS' SUNDAY

Washington, Aug. 8.—There won't be a bit of us going up in the air or suddenly taking the pledge if you see strange things happening in the sky tomorrow night. Of course, if tomorrow happens to be cloudy, it's all off. But if the night should be clear, expect most anything. Tomorrow night, according to officials of the naval observatory, is the one night in the year that thousands of mysterious little meteors and shooting stars which seem to emerge from the constellation Perseus, make their appearance. Perseus hangs low over the eastern sky, and tomorrow, if he acts according to his contract, will send innumerable glowing streaks and miniature comets across the sky every few minutes. These streaks leave in their trail particles which pass continually around the sun.

## KILLED BECAUSE HE DID NOT PLAY FAIR—DID SHE?

Portland, Aug. 8.—That he had induced her to secure a divorce from her husband under promise of marriage, had lived with her a year and then cast her aside; is the declaration today of Mrs. Bella Marsh, 27, a pretty stenographer, who late Friday shot and killed Bernard C. Lindstrom, 36, treasurer and manager of the Oregon Artificial Limb company, at the Palace hotel following a violent quarrel.

## F. J. HENRY ON TOUR.

Los Angeles, Aug. 8.—Francis J. Henry, progressive candidate for the United States senate, arrived today after a campaign tour of southern California. He will conclude his southern California campaign after four night speeches here, beginning tonight. The primaries will be held August 5.

## Late Yesterday

Los Angeles.—A pyromaniac started nine fires in the southwestern section of the city, and escaped. All were extinguished.

Los Angeles.—Two thousand German-Americans in mass meeting pledged several thousand dollars to the support of the families here of German reservists, under arms.

Watts, Cal.—The mayor, marshal and numerous town officials were arrested on charges of "electioneering too near the polls," during a wet-dry election. All are "wets."

At Winnipeg.—The Knights of Pythias voted their next convention to Portland, Ore.

At Chicago.—Dr. Olaf Lange, dentist, insane, killed his wife, 3-year-old son and himself.

At San Francisco.—Joseph Bush, a local business man, was killed in an automobile collision.

At Manhattan, Nev.—A cloudburst did enormous damage to placer mines and demolished several buildings.

At Washington.—Word was received that the warring factions in the dominion republics have agreed to a 15 days' armistice.

At San Francisco.—The supervisors' police committee voted to allow dancing as well as liquor selling in certain local hotels and cafes.
