PENALTIES ON TAXES NOT TO BE ENFORCED

Commission Says It Has No Authority to Raise Penalties, But If County Court Does, It Has Nothing to Say.

The conclusions of the state tax commission regarding the payment of penalties on the second half of the taxes were worked out today and copies sent to every county judge and county treasurer in the state. The following is the circular letter issued by the commission.

The Tax Commission is of the opinion that the provisions of Section 3082, Lord's Oregon Laws, as amended by Chapter 184, Laws of 1913, requiring the collection of penalties on the second half of taxes, paid before September 1, where the first half was paid before April 1, are definite and by no means unreasonable.

But injunctions restraining the collection of such penalties have been issued in Multnomah and one or two other counties. It is not necessary to discuss the propriety of these injunctions or the circumstances under which they were granted. They are facts and present a situation of interest to every county.

These injunctions as they stand are effective only in particular counties and, in the absence of affirmation by the supreme court, do not necessarily modify the administration of the law in other counties. At the same time, in sound reason and fair dealing, taxpayers of certain counties should not enjoy privileges and immunities in the administration of a tax law which are not granted to the taxpayers of all other counties.

This Commission has not sufficient authority under the law to order the tax collectors of the several counties to remit penalties on second-half tax payments. But, inasmuch as the county courts of the several counties prescribe the amounts and approve the bonds given by the tax collectors for the faithful performance of their duties, we are of the opinion that the county court of any county, by an order properly made, may accept the injunction granted in Multnomah county, and remit the penalties on second-half tax payments. In obeying such an order of the county court, the tax collector would be relieved of responsibility under his bond for failure to collect such penalties.

permit the city of Portland to issue another, Governor West believes the difficulties of the situation in Portland would be smoothed over. The gas company secured its franchise from the state over 60 years ago and the city of Portland has no authority over the company. Mayor Albee recently wrote to Governor West asking him to operate in settling the matter. The charter can only be revoked by the legislature but the people of the state at large have no interest in Portland's gas affairs and it is the opinion of Mr. West that the matter should be settled by the people of Portland. The simplest way would be for the company to surrender its charter and secure a new one from the city over which the city had authority.

Clifford, of Baker; and Floyd Bilyeu, of Portland, commissioners; State Game Warden C. H. Evans, State Superintendent of Hatcheries; E. Clanton, and William L. Finley, superintendent of the educational biological department of the fish and game commission.

War Bulletins

BASEL, Switzerland, Aug. 13.--The French and German losses in the fighting in and around Mulhausen have been enormous. Hospitals, school buildings, public halls, hotels and private homes were filled with wounded today. The number of German wounded was placed at more than 10,000. The number of French, though very large, was not exactly known.

LONDON, Aug. 13.--Because it had disregarded the port's wartime regulations and ignored a sloop across its bow, one of the British forts at Hong Kong today fired a cannon ball into the side of the Japanese steamship Shikoku badly damaging the vessel and killing a member of the crew, according to a cable received here from the scene of the incident. It was believed the Japanese government would be satisfied with the explanation that the ship had disregarded the port rules.

LONDON, Aug. 13.--The Turkish ambassador here today formally assured Foreign Secretary Sir Edward Grey that his country would remain neutral in the present European war.

PARIS, Aug. 13.--The Germans today resumed their attack on the allies' position in Belgium, the war office announced. No exact geographical details were given.

LONDON, Aug. 13.--Japan has agreed to join the British fleets in the Orient in an attack on the German China coast city of Tsing Tschau, according to a cable received today by the Central News from Tokyo. This announcement was unconfirmed.

LONDON, Aug. 13.--The French embassy here today officially denied that the Germans had captured a French regiment at Mulhausen.

ATHENS, Aug. 13.--The king of Greece today called a council of the members of his cabinet and all living ex-ministers. Pressure on Greece to take a hand in the European war was increasing. The king was anxious to remain neutral.

LONDON, Aug. 13.--News of a big naval fight was eagerly awaited here this afternoon. It was believed the German fleet was about to attempt a blow against the British naval power. Admiralty officials were obviously expectant.

PARIS, Aug. 13.--France's mobilization was completed today. It was understood aviators had fully informed General Joffre, the French commander of Germany's military dispositions and that the French were prepared everywhere. The war office admitted that the Longwy forts were engaged with the Germans.

PARIS, Aug. 13.--France's declaration of war against Austria-Hungary was officially published today.

DOVER, Eng., Aug. 13.--Sea firing was heard here today in a northwesterly direction.

LONDON, Aug. 13.--An Evening News dispatch from Brussels this afternoon said the Belgian military cabinet was unable to confirm a report that an attempt was made to kill King Albert Tuesday. His majesty was referred to as brave to the point of recklessness and as insisting on remaining constantly within the firing zone.

PARIS, Aug. 13.--Hard fighting at Orvain Tuesday was reported by the war office today. The Germans first repulsed two French battalions, it was stated, but the latter, reinforced, returned to the attack later and defeated the enemy, capturing a battery. It was added that Wednesday the French encountered the Twenty-first German dragons and captured nine officers and 1000 men.

LONDON, Aug. 13.--Russians were reported from St. Petersburg to have captured Sokol, Austrian Galicia, after driving out the Austrian garrison. Sokol is only 45 miles from the important city of Lemberg.

BIG CARLTON PLANT BURNED LAST NIGHT

Fire Broke Out At Midnight and Destroyed Mill and Lumber Valued at \$500,000--\$100,000 Worth of Lumber Saved.

Carlton, Or., Aug. 13.--The plant of the Carlton Lumber company is a mass of ruins today as the result of a fire which broke out shortly before midnight. The damage is estimated at \$500,000. The fire departments of McMinnville and Yamhill, rushed here by a special Southern Pacific freight train, co-operated with the local department in subduing the flames. Lumber valued at \$100,000 was saved through the efforts of the combine departments.

LEWIS REFUSES TO CERTIFY LANDS

State Engineer Lewis yesterday notified the State Desert Land Board that he had examined lands which the Central Oregon Irrigation Company wishes to have patented and that, because of excessive leakage, he would not certify them. The list comprises 6763 acres to be watered by the Pilot Butte canal.

The State Engineer also wrote Governor West a letter taking exception to a communication of the executive to Secretary of the Interior Lane. Mr. Lewis says in his letter:

"I regret to note that you take exception to the statement that 'this report (referring to one submitted to Mr. Lane regarding Government and state co-operation in irrigation work) has been jointly agreed upon by the co-operating parties,' stating that 'it should be changed to read co-operating engineers, as the co-operating parties include the Secretary of the Interior and the governor of Oregon, neither of whom have had to do with the preparation of the report, nor have as yet approved the findings.'"

Mr. Lewis says no provision is made in the contract for the approval or disapproval by the governor.

In his letter to the Desert Land Board declining to certify patents to land in the Central Oregon Irrigation project, the engineer makes the startling announcement that the seepage losses are 74 per cent of the water diverted. He says:

"Excessive seepage losses appear to result from cheap construction of the canals. Natural draws are used where it is apparent that such water escapes through crevices in the rock to subterranean passages."

Mr. Lewis says that he hopes his action will result in a definite provision for remedying the conditions before the settlers have paid in full for water which cannot be delivered.

WILDING A WINNER.

New York, Aug. 13.--Australia drew first blood in the challenge round for the Dwight F. Davis cup at Forest Hills this afternoon when Anthony F. Wilding defeated R. Norris Williams of Philadelphia in three straight sets in the first of the singles matches. Wilding won the match 7-5, 6-2, 6-3.

The singles match between Norman E. Brooks of the Australasian team and Maurice E. McLoughlin of San Francisco, began at 3:40 o'clock. At the end of the eighteenth game between Brooks and McLoughlin, the first set stood 9-9, each having won every game he served.

RATIFIED PEACE TREATIES.

Washington, Aug. 13.--By a vote of 45 to 7, the senate this afternoon ratified peace treaties with Norway and The Netherlands. Indications were that the remaining 18 treaties with other countries will be ratified at once, as the filibustering, which took the form of quorum calls, dwindled after the first vote.
