

### CARRANZA GIVEN OVATION AT CAPITAL

Populace Line Streets and Sing Hymn Composed for the Occasion As He Passed—Government for the People.

Mexico City, Aug. 21.—The occupation of Mexico City today by General Venustiano Carranza, commander in chief of the constitutional army, was complete. He entered the capital at noon yesterday, was proclaimed provisional president and then given an enthusiastic welcome by the crowds on the streets. Escorted by a squadron of cavalry and the Fourth Sonora battalion of infantry, which acted as a guard of honor, General Carranza mounted on a splendid horse, left Atzacotalco in time to enter Mexico City at noon. He was met at the city limits by the mayor and the city council. Hundreds of people were grouped along the line of march and as Carranza passed they sang a hymn written for the occasion. At the National theater the procession halted enough for Carranza to receive at the hands of workmen the flag which the late President Madero dropped at that very spot February 9, 1913, the date of the Huerta-Diaz uprising. He assured the populace that the revolution was over, and that the constitutionalists were to give a government for all the people and not for a small part of them.

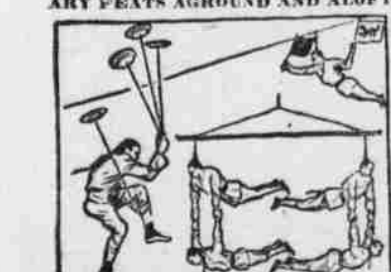

### ANALYZES SITUATION AT LONG DISTANCE

Points Out What Movements Mean and the Ultimate Possible Effects of Victories at Several Points.

New York, Aug. 21.—(11 a. m.)—The German occupation of Brussels poses a greater political than military advantage. The city is strategically unimportant at present, but if Germany holds it when the war ends it will possess a strong card at the congress which drafts the peace terms. Even if Germany should be defeated, its envoys will require all the material advantages they can show to minimize the terms against them and possession of Brussels will be a fact with important bearings and possibilities. The Belgian capital is somewhat important as a railroad and commissariat center for the German army, but the circumstances that it is in a community hostile to the invaders lessens its usefulness. The allies' strategy in abandoning it was admirable from an economic as well as from a military viewpoint, as its bombardment was thus prevented. Of the Belgians who retreated toward Antwerp probably only enough will enter that city to do garrison duty, the rest being detached for active field service.

No disputes mention the French or British as being with the Belgians in the north, and it is practically certain that they are in southern Belgium.

The Germans probably will not follow their advantage to the northward, as there seems nothing to gain by such a detour. They must plant a sufficient force in front of Antwerp to keep the garrison locked up, but the main purpose of their advance is to reach France.

A Paris dispatch suggests that if the Germans have selected a northern cycling route, the allies' plans will have to be rearranged.

The possibilities of disconnecting the enemy may have outweighed with the German general staff the danger of following the course of the Scheldt into France, with Antwerp's great fortification threatening first the German flank and then rear.

If so the strategy involved will be one of these daring war time strokes afterward described as the work of a genius if they succeed and the work of a fool if they fail.

The French operations about Metz and Saarbrück have been a feeling of the teeth in the lion's mouth of Strasbourg, and there has been no progress with the enveloping movement.

A French report mentions a French advance guard retreat to the River Sambre. The stream is close to the French frontier and about 15 miles west of half a dozen towns in Lorraine taken by General Joffre. If the French retreat, it means an evacuation of these, and Germany's second victory of the war.

### SWITZERLAND READY TO RESIST INVASION

Austrian Troops Gathering Presumably to Threaten Italy It Is Feared May Try to Cross Her Country to Aid Germans.

Basel, Aug. 21.—Swiss troops were keeping a very close watch today on the Austrian force concentrated in the Tyrol.

It was the general opinion that they were gathering with a view to hostilities with Italy, but due weight was given to the possibility that they might be intended further to strengthen the Germans in Alsace, in which case a watch along the Swiss-German border would be involved, perhaps attended, as happened in some instances, when the Duke of Tuscany's forces made the same journey recently, with violation of Swiss neutrality. The Swiss are determined to resist any invasions of their territory with force.

Youth of 18 Forces His Way in House and Fires Revolver to Intimidate Intruders and Captures 17-Year-Old Girl.

San Francisco, Aug. 21.—Advice received here today from San Jose said that Charles Bozelle, son of a wealthy merchant, had been arrested there following the alleged abduction here last night by him of Miss Sadie Broadhurst, aged 17 years, a trained nurse. Bozelle is 18.

According to the police, Bozelle drove up to the home of Dr. J. W. Hawkins, where Miss Broadhurst was attending a patient, forced his way into the house, fired a revolver to terrify its inmates, seized the girl, carried her out to an automobile and drove to San Jose at 50 miles an hour.

### DUTCH TROOPS MASS TO PROTECT BORDERS

Flushing, Holland, Aug. 21.—Dutch troops were concentrating today in the provinces of Zeeland and Dutch Brabant, on both sides of the Scheldt, to enforce neutrality in the event of a German attack on Antwerp.

The city is about 10 miles from the frontier but its outer fortifications, on the north, are but a mile and a half from it. An attack on them would almost inevitably mean a violation of Dutch territory. The closing of the Scheldt, which might be incidental to such an attack, would also constitute an infringement of Dutch neutrality, but British warships were depended on to guard against this.

### JOHN D. HAS SECRET SAFE

Hidden Alcove Protects the Hold of Private Papers from View.

Yonkers, N. Y., Aug. 20.—John D. Rockefeller has had an automatic time safe installed in his mansion at Pocantico Hills for valuables of a particularly personal nature.

No one but members of the family know what room it was placed in. Not even the servants were permitted to see where it was taken after it was unopened at a rear door of the dwelling. As a further safeguard a secret alcove was constructed off one of the rooms and the safe was placed in that.

Troopmen taking the safe to the premises were stopped by the small army of guards who swarm about the estate and since the L. W. W. disturbances and were not admitted until Mr. Rockefeller intervened in their behalf.

#### WHEAT IN CHICAGO.

Chicago, Aug. 21.—After opening unchanged, wheat advanced 1½¢ to 2 cents today, and then fell back about 1 cent. The volume of trading was narrow, and the bulge was apparently due to sentiment, rather than to the day's news developments.

The Canadian wheat crop is 45,000,000 bushels under last year, according to private estimates received here.

Trading in corn was fairly active and prices advanced early ¼ to ½ cents over yesterday's close.

#### AUCTION SALE AT UNION STOCK YARDS

Portland, Ore., Aug. 21.—The initial auction sale of high-bred rams, ewes and lambs, held under the auspices of

the Willamette Valley Woolgrowers' association, closed yesterday at the Union stockyards after a two-day session. It was a complete success and it is the intention of the association to make the affair an annual event. Similar sales are being held each year in England and the local growers expect to make their auctions equally notable, believing that western Oregon offers unequalled advantages for growing thoroughbred sheep.

Total sales aggregated about 1000 head and prices were satisfactory. Rams sold at from \$20 to \$60 a head. Cots-wold, Shropshire and Lincoln bucks in pens of ten sold at an average price of \$15 each. Good prices were offered for pure-bred stock and the only sheep in price was for poor quality sheep. Grades dragged somewhat.

Buyers were in attendance from about all the coast states and they made active bids for the stock offered. The results of the sale were most gratifying and growers were pleased with the outlook. The sheep growers concluded the affair with a banquet at the Hazelwood restaurant last night.

Prices for other livestock yesterday were practically unchanged, with offerings at the stockyards rather poorer than usual. Portland still maintained its lead as the highest market for hogs in the country, with the ruling price of 49.50 being paid for best stock.
