EITHER ENGLAND'S OR GERMANY'S LIFE

So Says Lord Churchill, "Must Put and Keep 1,000,000 Soldiers on Continent"

London, Sept. 12.—First Lord of the Admiralty Winston Churchill warned the British public, in an address at a big war meeting here last night, that reverses as well as victories must be expected in the fighting on the continent. The government, he said, was prepared for them.

"It is our life or Germany's," he declared. "There must be, there can be, neither compromise nor truce. We must go forward unflinchingly to the end."

The shipyards, he continued, are working night and day on all battle-ships in course of construction, and every vessel being built in Great Britain, no matter for what power it was intended, has been commandeered by the British.

"We should further," the first lord concluded, "put on the continent and keep there at least 1,000,000 soldiers. We must maintain that number regardless of any stress."

"By January 1, Lord Kitchener, the war minister, says we will have an additional 500,000 ready, and by the summer of 1915 we shall have 25 army corps in fighting trim."

Have Gone to France.

Ghent, Sept. 12.—Belgian forces from Antwerp were occupying their old positions in the north today.

The Germans had pushed on into France. Forty thousand of them were in this vicinity a few days ago. Today all were gone.

Their sudden withdrawal was interpreted as meaning that the German right wing was in danger of annihilation.

It was rumored that the Belgians would soon recapture Brussels.

Servis Is Active.

Nish, Servia, Sept. 12.—A combined Serbian and Montenegrin force was operating today near Sersajev, capital of the Austrian province of Bosnia and scene of the assassination of Archduke Francis Ferdinand and his wife, which was the immediate cause of the war.

Crown Prince Alexander, the Serbian commander, was following up his capture of Semlin, Hungary, by the capture of many other places in the Austrian province of Slavonia.

Another Serbian army had crossed the Danube into Hungary, near Belgrade.

The Austrian slav population was everywhere welcoming the invaders.
