HOP CROP LIGHTER THAN LAST YEAR

(Capital Journal Special Service.)
Independence, Ore., Sept. 11.—The weather has settled and from all appearances there will be good weather long enough to finish the harvesting of the hop crops. When the rain set in last week the hops could stand a great deal of rain without being damaged this year. This is due to the hot weather killing off all the lice. The rain washed off the hops and settled the dust, making the work more pleasant.

There are over 15,000 workers in the fields within five miles of this city, and it is thought that this is the largest crowd ever gathered around a city for work of this kind.

From all reports to date there is no doubt but that crop is about 20 to 30 per cent short of last year. The quality is superior to that of many years.

A young man who refused to give his name was arrested for throwing "high life" on horses. He was seen to squirt the liquid from a rubber bulb, and in two cases the level head by drivers of different horses was all that saved the horses from running away. On being arraigned he was found guilty and fined \$25. Being unable to pay he was remanded into the keeping of the city marshal. The next morning a friend appeared and paid his fine and they departed from the city. It is said that the man was from Prineville in Central Oregon. The absence of the justice of the peace from the city was all that saved the young man from a jail sentence for cruelty to animals.

A tree fell across one of the camps at the Wigrich ranch last night and seriously injured a young woman whose name could not be learned here today. Her husband was bruised slightly. The young woman was brought to town in an automobile this morning and taken to Portland on the morning train, where she was placed in a hospital.

L. W. Nesmith, electioneering for Fred Hollister for congress, was in the city this week. He reports a long dry summer in Salem.
