FOREST DEPARTMENT SELLS SOME TIMBER

The Forest Service has recently sold to the Corvallis Lumber Manufacturing Company 8,008,000 board feet of timber on the Santiam National Forest, Oregon.

The timber is situated on approximately 170 acres in sections 8 and 9, T. 10 S., R. 6 E., W. M., on the watershed of Dry Creek, which is tributary to the North Fork of the Santiam River, not far from Hoover, Oregon, and consists of 7,746,000 board feet of Douglas fir 400,000 board feet of western hemlock, 380,000 board feet of western hemlock, 380,000 board feet of western red cedar, and 13,000 board feet of western white pine.

The company is to pay for the timber in advance of cutting in instalments of not less than \$2,000 each, at the rate of \$1.35 per M for Douglas fir and western white pine, \$2.10 per M for western red cedar, and \$3.00 per M for western hemlock. By the contract of sale, the company will be allowed until June 30, 1916, for the cutting and removal of the timber.

PRESIDENT WILSON HAS HOPES FOR PEACE

Washington, Sept. 21.—President Wilson told callers today that he was "earnestly and powerfully" trying to further the cause of peace in Europe. He said he was anxious that the correspondents not print stories putting the administration in a false or foolish light. He was particularly displeased with stories that he contemplated calling a world's peace congress. Such articles, the president said, he feared would hamper his efforts to bring about peace in Europe.

Dallas' claim that it is an orderly town is supported by Marshal's report of only 40 arrests in a year. Half of these were for drunkenness, and the Observer says the greater number of these persons were non-residents.
