## CANADIAN APPLE CROP NOT A MENACE

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 23.—Special.—The Canadian apple crop is not going to be the menace to Northwestern apples on eastern markets that was predicted a few weeks ago, according to Walter M. Dickerson, who has just returned from Canada where he was one of the Northwest Pacific Fruit Distributors' district managers. Several weeks ago the opinion was freely expressed by authorities here because of the big apple crop generally, including Canada, and the curtailment of Canadian apple exports by the European war, Canadian apples would seek an outlet in the United States in competition with apples grown here.
