**CHINA DOES NOT KNOW OF JAP-MOVEMENTS**

Pekin, Sept. 23.—Of the progress of Japan's operations against the Germans at Kiao Chau practically nothing can be learned here, even in official quarters, owing to the strictness of the Japanese censorship. Chinese government functionaries themselves near the scene of the campaign are not allowed to send out anything concerning Japanese reverses, delays or even slight losses. There has been no objection to the filing of news telling of victories by the nikato's forces, but only such vague references to regiments and warships are permitted that it is impossible to tell what is meant.

Mail advices from Tokio are to the effect that a similar policy has been adopted with reference to incoming cables, with the result that the people have been regaled with a stirring series of Japanese successes but have heard next to nothing of any of the difficulties of the campaign.

**CHOLERA BREAKS OUT AMONG AUSTRIAN SOLDIERS**

Vienna, via Rome, Sept. 23.—That a number of cholera cases had been discovered among soldiers just back from the front was officially admitted here today. The news created much alarm and the city immediately appropriated 1,000,000 crowns to provide for the construction of isolation barracks. An epidemic of dysentery already existed in Vienna.

## FOUR BODIES FROM WRECK RECOVERED

Gasoline Schooner Tillamook Picks Them Up Sunday and They Are Held Pending Instructions, at Gardiner.

Marshfield, Or., Sept. 22.—The four bodies of victims of the steamer Leggett picked up by the gasoline schooner Tillamook into Sunday were being held at Gardiner today pending instructions from the steamship company or relatives.

One of the bodies is believed to be that of H. F. Davis. A bank book found on the body bears this name. H. F. Davis also appears on the passenger list.

The only thing to lead to the identity of the body of the woman was a wedding ring inside of which was engraved "E. J. to C. P."

On the third body, that of a man, was found \$59 in money and a number of receipts made out to W. M. Walker. On the fourth body, also a man, was found a small memorandum book in which the name of Gilbert T. Head was written. As the name was written on the front of the book it was believed to be that of the owner rather than a notation.

**Aged Twin in Hospital.** (Polk County Observer.) Lying at the Dallas hospital where he underwent a critical operation a few days ago, Joseph Haines, one of Oregon's famous 87-year-old twins, is recovering nicely. Mr. Haines resides at Monmouth, and his twin brother in Lane county.

**OREGON'S COUNTY LIBRARIES BEST**

Oregon and California have the best county library systems in the world, according to the work shown at the recent meeting of the Pacific Northwest library association at Spokane, which was attended by Miss Cornelia Martin, state librarian. Miss Martin, who was elected a member of the executive committee, reports the libraries and commercial club of Salem having extended an invitation to the association to meet in Salem next year and that it is likely this city will be selected as the next meeting place.

After the meeting at Spokane Miss Martin visited the libraries in eastern Oregon. She reports that Walla Walla county has an excellent system of libraries, and that the women's clubs and organizations have taken up the

work of promoting libraries in that section with good success. Both county books and state books are to be found in these libraries and they are well patronized. Umatilla county also has a complete library system. A county tax is voted to buy books and they are controlled from the central library at Pendleton. A resident of the smallest hamlet may have the privilege of the largest library by applying at the nearest station to the librarians, who will secure the books desired. Wasco and Hood River counties also have a special county system.

In the county systems each town pays the local maintenance tax and the money set aside from the county tax is devoted entirely to the purchase of books. All of these libraries in addition receive books from the state library and many people in the most remote parts of the state are receiving helpful and entertaining books as well as his city brother who lives in the shadow of an imposing library building.
