**NOTICE OF REVIEW AND EQUALIZATION OF ASSESSMENT ROLL.** The State Tax Commission will attend as a board of equalization at the Capitol in Salem, Oregon, on the third Monday in October, 1914, and publicly examine the assessment roll by it made, and review the same, and correct all errors in valuations, descriptions, quantities, or qualities of property by it assessable, and in appointments of assessors made by it; and it shall be the duty of the persons and corporations interested to appear at the time and place appointed.

Petitions or applications for the re-division of change of apportionment of a particular assessment shall be made in writing, verified by the oath of the applicant, its president, secretary, managing agent or attorney in fact, and be filed with the board during the first week it is by law required to be in session, and any petition or application not so made, verified and filed shall not be considered or acted upon by the board.

### CAMPAIGNING WITH A PURPOSE.

(East Oregonian.) If a report from southern Oregon is true Dr. Withycombe is resorting to plain deception in hopes of making votes. He is quoted by a Portland paper as having said at Medford he endorsed the direct primary and was in the fullest sympathy and accord with that law.

Four years ago Dr. Withycombe went before the state assembly to seek an endorsement for the nomination for governor. He said at the time and he has said many times since that he did so because he believed in the assembly. He has upheld assemblyism in public and in private talks during this campaign and assemblyism, if adopted means death to the direct primary. Assemblyism would take the very heart out of the primary law and leave nothing but an empty shell. No man who supports assemblyism is in sympathy and accord with the direct primary and if Dr. Withycombe talked as he is credited with having talked at Medford he is campaigning with a "double tongue."

If Dr. Withycombe's "advisors" persuaded him to make that Medford statement they have blundered again. They cannot hope to get away with such double dealing as that. Nothing can wipe out the Withycombe record of approval for assemblyism and in talking as he did at Medford the candidate merely sacrificed his reputation for veracity.

After attempting a two faced attitude on this important subject how can people have confidence in any declaration Dr. Withycombe may make?

**ENTIRE CREW PERISHED.** Petrograd, Oct. 13.—At least one of the German submarines responsible for the sinking of the Russian armored cruiser Pallada in the Baltic October 11 was believed here today to have been disabled in the fight by the cruiser Bayan, which was scuttling with the Pallada at the time the latter was lost.

That the Pallada's entire crew perished was admitted. Its full complement was 568 men.
