The case of M. Barde and son against D. Samuels will be called in the circuit court tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock and the case of the State against A. J. Anderson will be called at 1 o'clock.

The Rev. E. D. Hornschuh has been re-elected president of the United Ministerial association of Portland, which held its first meeting for the year yesterday morning at the Y. M. C. A. Other officers are: Vice-president, J. R. Parsons; secretary, J. A. Goode; and treasurer, H. Schuchardt.

Great plans are being made at the Salem Y. M. C. A. this afternoon for the annual members meeting and banquet which will be held this evening at 6:30. A large attendance is expected and the promoters promise something special both in the line of entertainment and refreshments.

At the "Bunagab" Christian church, corner 17th and Court streets, Mr. Hassel discovered last night at the "Bunagab" church on the subject of the Devalence of the Hebrews from bondage and clearly and graphically showed it to be a type of the deliverance of the whole world from the bondage of sin, through the Gospel. For the purpose of demonstrating to the people of the Willamette valley that field corn can be grown successfully in this section of the country, Luther J. Chapin, county agriculturalist, is promoting a Corn Show to be held in this city November 13 and 14. Mr. Chapin has looked over the corn fields in Kaiser bottom and reports the corn in that section ripening as well as it does any place in the United States, and that the yield will be heavy. He is spending this week in looking over the corn crops in different parts of this county to secure exhibits for the Corn Show.

Protesting against the removal of the station on the Woodburn-Springfield branch of the Southern Pacific railroad from the present stopping place, at Tiglestad, in Marion county, O. L. Hatteberg, a former member of the legislature from this county, has addressed the railroad commission stating that the greatest number of patrons are served under the present conditions and location of the station than would be the case of the station were moved. The commission received a petition last week, signed by 18 citizens of the Tiglestad neighborhood, asking that the railroad station be moved from Tiglestad to Paradise Alley or McKinley crossing. Mr. Hatteberg's communication comes in the nature of a remonstrance.

The two state accountants who have been experting the books of County Treasurer Moore in the tax collecting department after two weeks' work in checking up found when they completed their task last week-end that George Paulus had overcharged the taxpayers of the county 26 cents on a little over a million dollars which he handled during the course of the year. The two-cent overcharge came in collecting interest on delinquent taxes. The accounts showed that the taxes collected amounted to \$933,288.01, on errors, and double amounts was the sum of \$10,370.76, delinquent taxes amounted to \$43,239.90, making a total of \$1,000,888.67 on the roll when it was turned over by the tax collector to the sheriff for the collection of delinquent taxes.

ROCK CRUSHER TO BE RUN BY PRISONERS

The county court will be able to secure crushed rock for road work cheaply within a short time when the rock crusher operated by convicts is put in operation. A 50-horsepower, single-phase motor arrived yesterday at the plant of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company to furnish motive power, and it is thought the plant will be running within ten days. The motor will be installed at once.

The rock crusher is located about one-half mile beyond the fence minded home, where there is an unlimited supply of raw material. The daily output of the crusher will be about 50 yards and it is expected 10 convicts will be able to do the work. The proceeds of the crusher will be turned over to the penitentiary welfare fund and will be used to keep up the institution, to make improvements and for general maintenance. Warden Lawson expects to net several thousand dollars from the plant, which will save an appropriation from the state.

Some 10 convicts have been employed at the home for feeble minded this summer, for which the prison receives \$1 daily for the labor of each. This money is also turned over to the welfare fund. The men will work eight hours a day and will be in charge of four guards. About 2000 yards of rock have already been blasted down ready for the crusher. The motor to run the plant is the largest single-phase motor on the lines of the Salem plant.

COMPANIES MUST SHOW PROPERTY VALUES

For the purpose of facilitating the work of the commission and the avoidance of unnecessary delay in the securing of evidence in cases pending adjustment, the railroad commission this morning made an order amending rule 10 of the rules of practice and procedure before the commission, effective October 15, 1914, requiring public utility corporations to file a report of the actual value of its property in any proceeding before the commission, instead of the present rule which requires the filing of a statement of the tentative value of property which was subject to revision and verification before being introduced as evidence. The new rule requires a public utility to file in duplicate a complete itemized statement showing all units of property, tangible and intangible, the original cost, reproduction cost and present condition thereof.

The sample ballots for the coming election have reached the printers and a proof returned to County Clerk Gehlhar shows a ballot 14 inches wide by 28 inches long bearing three columns of names and answers to be voted on. The ballots this year are printed in six point type which is a smaller type than is generally used in the regular matter of newspapers where 8 point is in the most general use. The numbers are printed in extra large black face type.

The case of S. E. Snyder against A. C. Keene was on in the circuit court today. Snyder is suing for \$7500 damages on account of an injury which it is alleged he received on account of a fall from the barn of the defendant caused by a defective scaffold. Blaine McCreedy and McNary, Smith and Shields are appearing for the plaintiff and Carson and Brown for the defendant. The foreman was taken up with the selection of the jury.

A continuous line was standing in front of the register in the county clerk's office today and the biggest rush since the books have opened has begun. The reason for the unusual run is that many of the voters have neglected to register until the last week and as the books close at 5 o'clock Saturday night many are hastening to get their names down. The books at the county court house will be kept open from 9 o'clock to 5:30 in the evening during the rest of the week.

Mrs. Crescencio Kelsey, of Harrisburg, notified the Salem Police today that she has lost her gold watch and that it was reported that it had been pawned to a chinaman who had since gone to this city. The chief of police began a search of the newly arrived Chinese and found the watch. It was on its way back to the owner within an hour after her letter was received.

THE BOERS REBEL

London, Oct. 13.—Martial law was proclaimed throughout British South Africa today, following discovery of a plot in Colonel Maritz's command to establish an independent republic in the northwest of the Cape provinces. Admission that anti-British Boers were in rebellion came also from the official war news bureau. The insurrectionists, it was said, were armed with German guns and aided by German troops from the Kaiser's territories in Southwest Africa. The government was hopeful, however, that the bulk of the Boer population would remain loyal to the British.

NORMAL SCHOOL AT ASHLAND GETS BOOST

The imperative need for legislation requiring greater preparation on the part of teachers and normal schools in Oregon to furnish this preparation, in the gist of the special report of Superintendent J. Percy Wells, of Jackson county, to State School Superintendent Churchill, in reply to the request of the latter for suggestions as to the line of needed legislation for the benefit of the school system of the state.

"Under the present system," says Mr. Wells, "the centers of population get the trained teachers and the boys and girls in the rural schools whose inherent rights are equal to those of the city boys and girls, must go along with the untrained teachers. This will be remedied only when we have trained teachers for every school."

The report also commends the increased facilities for supervision in the rural schools which incites greater interest in the country school and better efforts on the part of the teachers; the value of industrial education for the children; the new eighth grade examination rules; and the standardizing of the high school system of the state.
