**STORY ABOUT EGGS OTHER THAN CHINA**

**"The Demand Will Be Well Nigh Insatiable for Eggs from Now On"**

The article following was clipped from the Oregonian of Sunday, October 18, and is given here for two reasons, one of which is that it is well written by a man who evidently understands his subject and is both interesting and full of valuable information; and the other that it shows how our big contemporary pollutes its editorial page in dealing with the subject of eggs, in its efforts to make political capital out of the discredited tariff. The article was written by F. W. Ludwig and is as follows:

"For some time we have heard quite a little about money being tight and the times a little hard in the business centers. We hear little of it from the farmers and we would hear a good deal more about hard times if it were not for the great American hen. One must be impressed with this fact that the future of livestock husbandry in the United States was never so assured as at this moment. The demand for poultry and eggs will be extraordinary. The domestic market and the foreign trade will readily absorb the supply at good prices. The demand will be well nigh insatiable for eggs and poultry from now on, because of the high prices of other meats and of grains. Eggs will be the cheapest concentrated food that people can buy, while poultry will be really the cheapest meat."

"There must be a veritable boom ahead for poultry. A golden market awaits these products, which can be produced readily within three to six months. Farmers, begin now and keep more hens. Give them better attention. Use incubators for raising more and better chickens. Then sell more eggs and dressed poultry."

"It is no trouble at all to get a net profit of \$100 a year from 100 hens valued at \$50. What other farm product can you mention that will produce such a profit on an equal investment? Give poultry the same care and attention that other stock receives on the farm and they will pay handsomely. They will not do it if left to shift for themselves, nor will anything else pay under careless conditions."

"Farmers, you need not be afraid of overstocking the market with poultry and eggs. According to the figures of the 13th census of the United States, the farmers and poultrymen of America actually placed upon the market 1,000,000,000 dozen of eggs. In addition over 600,000,000 were consumed for table and hatching purposes. It is estimated that the eggs sold totaled nearly \$200,000,000."

"The increased and ever-increasing price of meats—beef, pork and mutton—very naturally increase the demand for eggs. Eggs are such a handy commodity to prepare for the table that they are ever going to be in demand."

"The congested centers of this country depend to a great extent upon the farms of the Middle West for their eggs. A recent bulletin published by the New Jersey experimental station, states that although the great bulk of her eggs goes to New York City, yet this great flood of eggs amounts only to about 20 per cent of the total receipts of this great city."

**MAKE HEROIC DEFENSE**

**THIS IS APPLE DAY IN THE NORTHWEST**

**Oregon Has Apple Day and Washington Begins Observing "Apple Week"**

Portland, Oct. 20.—Everyone in Oregon is eating apples today in celebration of Apple Day, set aside annually to stimulate the use of the beautiful fruit. Thousands of boxes were being bought by thrifty housekeepers for future use, as the price was placed much below the normal for the occasion.

In Portland 30,000 apples were distributed free in the public schools, and 10,000 more were given to inmates of various charitable institutions.

A unique feature of the day here was an apple-eating contest, in which 407 boys participated.

The celebration is general throughout the Northwest.

Seattle Gets In.

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 20.—Thirty thousand boxes of apples awaited purchasers in Seattle this morning, the beginning of Apple Day, when under a big tent on Bon Marche Park, Seattle's first apple exhibit opened. It is believed 50,000 boxes will be sold before the close of the week, Saturday night.

Apple Week, which being observed throughout the Northwest is designed to move the 1914 apple crop, which, indirectly affected by the European war, threatened to become a white elephant on the growers' hands, and also to educate the people in this region to a better appreciation of apples.

Civic organizations, hotels, clubs, business houses, railroad and steamship lines, and the express companies, all have co-operated to make Apple Week a success.

"Apple Week" is designated by a proclamation by Governor Lister.

**FEDERAL CONTROL OF STOCK EXCHANGE**

**Millionaire Perkins Says that Either Federal or State Control Is Necessary**

New York, Oct. 20.—That the New York stock exchange should be entirely reorganized and placed under the supervision of state or federal government before it is allowed to reopen, was the declaration here today of Geo. W. Perkins, multi-millionaire and former partner of the late J. Pierpont Morgan.

"The exchange," he said, "has ceased to be a private or even a national concern. It is an international affair and the world's greatest market. At present it is in a state of chaos and confusion and seriously injured business. The only way to restore confidence is to place the exchange under control. And now is the time."

"Personally I would like to see the exchange under federal supervision, but if the government is not ready to go that far, the state should do it. Instead of handicapping the exchange, it would be of great benefit. It also would be a distinct advantage in the protection of purchasers of securities."

**OUR SUBMARINES ARE BEST IN WORLD**

**Secretary Daniels Says New Types Being Constructed—Great for Defense**

Washington, Oct. 20.—Secretary of the Navy Daniels admitted today that he was withholding his recommendations as to the naval needs of the United States pending tests of submerged fighting machines in the European war. Despite the remarkable effectiveness demonstrated by German submarines since the European war began, it was believed that battleships still hold their place as the paramount factor in warfare on the sea.

"While the submarine is a most effective defensive weapon," said Secretary Daniels in an official statement, "and has great possibilities of marked development in the future as an offensive weapon, it is not believed that submarines in their present state of development will decide any naval war, but that the paramount need of the present-day navy is for battleships, by which the ultimate test of strength will be decided."

"As far as submarines are concerned, it is believed that ours are on a par with any in the world. The development of our types has been logical, and in each new type the ideas and comments of the officers and men who operate the submarines in service have been considered. In the appropriation made by the last congress two types for the first time were included: one of high surface speed, to accompany the fleet, and one for coast and harbor defense."

**BUSINESS GIRLS CLUB AIDS THE BELGIANS**

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 20.—The Seattle Business Girls' club decided last night to not hold their banquet this year but to send the \$1,000 the banquet would cost to war-torn Belgium.

This action came after Samuel Hill, multi-millionaire and good roads advocate, who annually throws open his palatial home here to the girls for their banquet, had outlined the sorrow and suffering that has come to Belgium, "the cockpit of Europe."

The club will send this letter with the money:

"H. M. King Albert of Belgium: Sir, Our honorary member, Mr. Samuel Hill has told us about your beautiful country, about you and your beautiful queen, and that your one desire in life was to keep Belgium always smiling."

"We have read of the great sorrow that has come to you and your people, which nothing can assuage."

"Every year we have our annual dinner and this year we send you a check for 5,000 francs, the cost of the dinner; not that the sum is much, but that we want you to feel that we, in common with the whole world, sympathize with you and yours."

**CLEETON HOLDS HIS CIRCUIT JUDGESHIP**

Under an opinion written by Justice Burnett, in which Justices Bean, Ramsey and Eakin concurred, and Justices McBride, Moore and McNary dissented, the supreme court this morning held that that part of the act of the legislative assembly of 1912 which created the office of the fifth judge for the circuit court for Multnomah county was valid, but that portion of the act which transferred the proceedings which regularly come before a county judge, especially probate matters, to the circuit court, was illegal and unconstitutional, and that, while Judge T. J. Cleeton, formerly county judge, was elected to the circuit court judgeship, holds his office in the circuit court, there is a vacancy in the office of the county judge and it will be up to the governor to appoint someone to fill this vacancy.

In the dissenting opinion, written by Justice McBride, in which Justices Moore and McNary concur, three members of the supreme court contend that that part of the decision which declares that part of the act transferring probate business to the circuit court unconstitutional is erroneous. In the affirmative opinion by the majority members of the appellate court Judge Cleeton, of the circuit court for Multnomah county, whose job was held in jeopardy by reason of the contentions contained in the suit, was sustained in his decision.

**Max Cohen Is Disbarred.**

In a per curiam opinion the supreme court this morning also ordered the disbarment of Max U. Cohen, an attorney of Portland, from practice in any of the courts of Oregon and that his name be stricken from the roll of attorneys of the supreme court, on the ground of his conviction of perjury in the United States district court for Oregon.

**VEXING PROBLEM IS PROBABLY ANSWERED**

"No such thing as disagreeable work in this home," is the inspiring reply of the domestic in at least one Oregon household to the question: "What is the most disagreeable part of your occupation?" contained in a list of questions sent out by Labor Commissioner Haff in an effort to shed some statistical light upon the household servant problem in his fourteenth biennial report to the legislature. Washing dishes seemed to be the burden of the plaint of several of the household servants who replied to the questions asked; three disliked bed-making, and one answered: "When the lady gets cranky." It may be that the whole secret to the solution of the vexing "servant problem" is exposed in the first and last quoted replies of servants to the labor commissioner's question.

**PRUNE MARKET HAS LITTLE LIFE**

Portland, Ore., Oct. 20.—Prune market is absolutely void of demand at this time. Recently a large local packer sold a big block of Oregon prunes to the east on the basis of 5c a pound but at this time it is a very serious question if any more business could be landed immediately at that figure.

Leaders of the dried prune industry here are optimistic regarding the future of the prune trade, notwithstanding the present bad features on the industry. J. T. Brumfield, manager of Mason, Ehrman & Co., expresses the opinion that the present situation cannot continue for an extended period and that an improvement is sure to follow general adjustment in business conditions.

"Sales of prunes have been made by packers here at 5c a pound or 1 1/2 to 2c a pound under the values quoted 30 days ago," says Mr. Brumfield. "The eastern markets are in bad shape at this time and really do not want to buy. Business conditions are being adjusted to fit new world's conditions and when this is completed I look for a resumption in not only prunes, but in general trade."

"The Pacific northwest has been depending considerably upon the huge foreign demand it has worked up for its prunes, apples, hops and other commodities. Everything was going along in good shape until the war started in Europe and since then there has been practically no business. At the present time I know of no foreign demand for prunes."

Other operators express a like opinion regarding the present and future outlook.

**JAPAN'S OCCUPATION OF ISLANDS COMPLETE**

Tokio, Oct. 20.—Japan's military occupation of the Marianne, Marshall and Caroline Islands, German groups in the South seas, has been completed, it was officially announced here today. In connection with it, it was stated, one German ship was sunk and another captured. The official announcement added that German submarine S-96 which recently escaped from Kiao Chau bay despite the blockade, had been wrecked on the Hawaiian coast.

**IDAHO TREASURER FORCED TO QUIT**

Boise, Idaho, Oct. 20.—State Treasurer O. V. Allen is Treasurer in name only. He has been temporarily succeeded by that capacity by Axel P. Ramstedt, president of the State Tax Commission, appointed by Governor Haines to audit the books and accounts in the treasury department with three representatives of the National Surety Company, which stands surety on \$200,000 bonds on behalf of State Treasurer Allen to the state. The surety company's agents are making an investigation of the accounts for its own protection. The combinations to the safe have been changed and the keys to the office turned over to Mr. Ramstedt, an expert accountant.

State Treasurer Allen placed his resignation in the hands of Governor Haines, according to an announcement made today by the Governor.

"For some time the treasurer has been the target of political attacks bearing on subjects separate and apart from his office," said the governor. "This, as seems apparent, caused the surety bonding companies to send experts here to audit the treasurer's books. In view of the whole situation, Mr. Allen handed me his resignation, that the inquiry might proceed with a free hand."

**EIGHT HOURS AND LITTLE WORK.**
