A DOUBTFUL STORY.

Copenhagen, Oct. 21.--An attempt by British submarines to sink several German destroyers off Hopen Island was reported here today. Details were wholly lacking.

OFFICIAL NAILS CAMPAIGN ARGUMENT.

Editor Journal: I am informed that on account of Mr. Woolery's candidacy for the office of city marshal of Salem some parties are referring to his conduct while employed at the Oregon state penitentiary. Concerning the fact that he was found sleeping while on duty, I desire to say a few words in his behalf.

If I remember right, he began work at the above mentioned institution on or about January 17, 1907, and served as guard until November 22, 1912, with the exception of a few months following his resignation about a year before. I wish to say that during his connection with the O. S. P. he proved himself a good and efficient officer. I remember that on November 21, 1912, the day prior to his dismissal, he informed me that owing to the illness of his wife he had been obliged to sit up for several nights, and on account of loss of sleep he did not feel able to do a full day's duty, and owing to the fact that there was no extra man about the place to relieve him at that time, it was almost absolutely necessary for him to remain at his post of duty when he was not in condition to do so.

I feel certain that if those interested understood the conditions under which he was laboring at the time, they would not condemn him, but on the other hand would extend their sympathy.
