

DROWN IN TEXAS FLOOD.

San Antonio, Texas, Oct. 24.—Searchers were seeking today the corpses of 11 women and children known to have drowned yesterday in a fifteen foot flood in the San Antonio river, caused by a five inch rain in less than three hours. The San Pedro and Alizon creeks also were out of their banks. Several persons are missing and it is feared they also were drowned. Seven members of the Liebe family were lost, including Mrs. Albert Liebe and an infant son born just before the flood.

Lawrence T. LINN ENDORSED FOR STATE SENATOR
Former Woodburn Resident, New Candidate, Greets Old Friends and Makes New Ones.

J.
