
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THE REPORT OF THE PARTY OF THE

Splendid Example of Diversified Farming in Northwest,

DIVERSIFIED FARMING is gaining in favor in the Northwest every year. The improvidence of depending upon one crop for success or failure is impressing itself upon the farmer and he prefers, to carry out the old proverb, not to put all his eggs in the same basket.

A noticeable feature of the recent Oregon State Fair at Salem was the number of diversified farming exhibits. Few exhibitors depended on displays of any one product, but grain, berries and fruit went hand in hand. No retrogression in grade-could be noticed from the years when the exhibits represented the sole efforts of the many growers.
