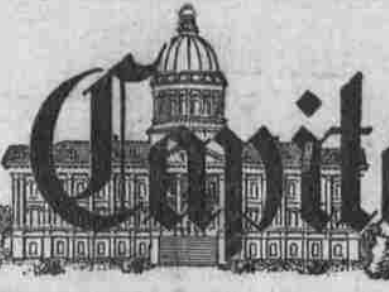

CHAMBERLAIN 16,000
WITHYCOMBE 18,000
PROHIBITION 14,000

Portland, Ore., Nov. 4.—George E. Chamberlain, democrat, was re-elected United States senator from Oregon by a plurality of approximately 16,000 votes over R. A. Booth, his republican opponent, returns today indicate. William Hanley, progressive, ran a very poor third. Returns from 205 precincts in Multnomah county, of which 36 are complete and 334 incomplete from the other counties of the state, give Chamberlain 23,486; Booth, 19,788, and Hanley, 4886. If the present ratio continues, Chamberlain will carry Multnomah county by approximately 8000 votes and will receive an equal plurality from the rest of the state.

Senator Chamberlain has probably carried two-thirds of the counties. Incomplete returns from Multnomah county and the state at large indicate the election of Dr. James Withycombe, republican, as governor of Oregon, over Dr. C. J. Smith, his democratic opponent, by a plurality of approximately 18,000 votes. Dr. Withycombe apparently carried Multnomah county with 16,000 plurality.

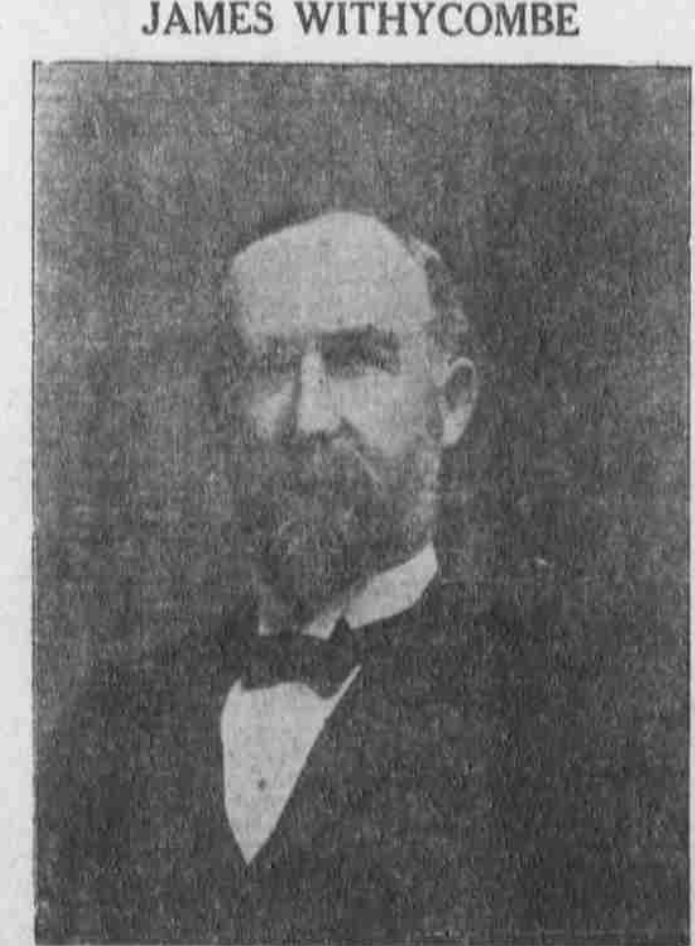
Incomplete returns from the state outside of Multnomah county show that Dr. Withycombe has thus far received 14,167 votes and Dr. Smith 11,377. The vote cast for the other gubernatorial candidates was negligible.

With complete returns from 17 Oregon counties outside of Multnomah, indications at 1 p. m. today were that the state had voted in favor of the prohibition amendment which is effective January 1, 1916.

The vote in these counties, in no case complete, shows 8,724 favoring prohibition and 8,707 against prohibition.

Portland, Ore., Nov. 4.—Late this afternoon it became more apparent that Oregon had gone dry. Returns from counties outside of Multnomah with about one-third of the vote totaled, will apparently bring the measure up to Multnomah county with something like 18,000 votes. Multnomah county's vote thus far only shows a majority of about 7,000 against prohibition.

Portland, Ore., Nov. 4.—Returns late this afternoon did not materially change Chamberlain's plurality of 16,000 over Booth. Chamberlain's lead is now 2942 outside of Multnomah and 3073 lead in Multnomah. If this ratio is maintained Chamberlain will have a plurality of 8000 in Multnomah and 800 in the other counties.

DEMOCRATS WILL CONTROL CONGRESS
Estimated They May Have Majority of 20 But This May Be Lessened

New York, Nov. 4.—Latest available returns from points throughout the country indicated today that Tuesday's election left the democrats in control of congress.

The democrats gained at least one senator. In the house their majority dwindled, but they probably will have a leeway of 20, though the republicans don't concede it.

Cyrus Sulloway, a republican, was returned to congress after two years absence, from New Hampshire. Edward Wason, another republican, was elected in the same state.

The republicans gained one seat in Rhode Island, three in Massachusetts and five in Connecticut.

Washington, Nov. 4.—While administration officials here admitted privately today that Tuesday's republican landslide was a "cataclysm," they still insisted President Wilson would be re-elected in 1916.

Men in high positions in the administration owned that they expected republican gains but were surprised at their magnitude.

DEMOCRATS GAIN SEATS IN SENATE BUT LOSE IN HOUSE
Will Have Safe Majority in the House Probably About Twenty

New York, Nov. 4.—Latest election returns, received here this afternoon from points throughout the country, served only to emphasize the extent of the progressive losses and the rejuvenation of the republican party, despite the fact that the democrats remained in control of national affairs.

The democratic majority in the house of representatives had dwindled to 19 on the face of the returns, though there was still a possibility that returns from districts not yet heard from definitely, might bring this number up to 27.

The democrats, as a partial offset against their losses in the house, may prove to have gained five senate seats.

STORY OF WAR NOW INCLUDES TURKS; DAY'S NEWS IN BRIEF

Much naval activity was developing in connection with the European war today. A strong German fighting squadron was reported to have left its base presumably to prey on the allies' shipping, and indications were that a British fleet hoped to intercept and give it battle.

Admiral Von Spee, commander of the German cruisers Gnesienau, Scharnhorst, Dresden, Nurnberg and Leipsic, which sunk the British cruiser Monmouth, undoubtedly destroyed the cruiser Good Hope and forced the cruiser Glasgow and supply ship Otranto to intern in neutral harbors off Chile Sunday, reported that the loss of life was "terrible."

A German report spoke casually of the sinking of 17 Russian transports by the Turks. The Turkish Black sea fleet sank the Russian cruiser Sinop. It was learned that at the same time the British submarine D-5 was sunk by German cruisers, the mine layers Fraternal and Copious were also destroyed.

German warships were believed about to raid the Russian coast. British and French ships were bombarding the Dardanelles forts and one of them was hit by a shell from on shore and badly damaged.

The allies declared the Germans were in steady retreat from the North sea to the Aisne. It was admitted, however, that they were simultaneously trying vainly to resume the aggressive and hard fighting was reported at many points as far south as Verdun, while on the Aisne the allies themselves actually were driven back.

At one place 3,200 of them were said to have been cut off and captured after they had exhausted their ammunition. The Russians owned the Germans on the east Prussian frontier had resumed the offensive and skirmishing was already in progress preliminary to an expected general engagement.

The Japanese reported silencing the German garrison at one of the Kiao Chau defenses, and sinking the cruiser Kaiserin Elisabeth in Kiao Chau bay.

CZAR'S MOSLEMS TO BE TRUE TO ENGLAND

London, Nov. 4.—Aga Khan, who is known as the spiritual head of the Mohammedans in India, East Africa and Central Asia, has sent a cablegram from London addressed to the Moslems in India and other British dominions, in which he expresses his deep sorrow that Turkey has joined hands with Germany in the war.

PENDER TO HANG IN THREE WEEKS

St. Helens, Ore., Nov. 4.—Judge Alkon has signed the death warrant of John A. Pender. The order names November 27, 1914, as the day the superintendent of the penitentiary is to hang him.

ENGLISH MILITIA SENT TO THE FRONT

London, Nov. 4.—England's territorial militia are at last in France. The territorial correspond to the American militia. It was expected that some or later they would be called on to join the regulars in the field but that they actually had gone was not known, so secretly is the British war office doing its work, until one of the official information bureau's "eyes witnesses" stories today referred to the "London Scottish," a well known territorial regiment.

RUSSIANS ANNOUNCE INVASION OF TURKEY

Petrograd, Nov. 4.—A Russian invasion of Turkey in force was officially announced here today. Ottoman subjects were attacked, it was said, advance guards were repelled and seven villages were occupied. Turkish losses were said to have been very heavy.
