GARRANZA DEFIES MEXICAN CONVENTION

Says He Will Not Recognize the President Appointed By Its Authority

El Paso, Texas, Nov. 3.—Because of alleged persecutions of the church and the clergy, the Catholic residents of Toluca, Mexico, revolted against the Carranza government, according to advices received here today. Fighting between the religious forces and Carranzistas under General Francisco Murguía has been in progress for three days. The state in which Toluca is located is wholly Catholic and practically every citizen has joined in the revolt against the Carranza government. General Murguía appealed today to the Aguan Calientes peace conference for assistance in putting down the revolt. The peace conference is now debating the personnel of the cabinet which will be selected as part of the government under General Guiterrez to succeed Carranza as provisional president.

From Puebla, Mexico, General Carranza wired Conal General Murguía here today a message of defiance of the Aguan Calientes conference in naming a successor to him as head of the Mexican government. "The convention at Aguan Calientes," Carranza wired, "having failed to comply with the conditions I fixed for my retirement from the duties I now perform, I have not taken into consideration their resolution regarding the naming of the provisional president to substitute for me, and I intend to continue to discharge the duties of my office."

CITY COUNCIL HAS BUSINESS SESSION

Appoints Councilman and a Night Policeman in Place of A. C. Fisher

One new councilman and one new policeman were elected at the meeting of the city council last night and the charter committee reported that it would have the new charter ready for the vote on Friday night at 7:30, when a special meeting will be held. W. L. Cummings, who has served the people of the Fourth ward since the last election, resigned, as he was moving his home from this ward. A. B. Huddelson was chosen to fill the unexpired term. Mr. Huddelson was elected as councilman from this ward last night at the primary election, as he had no opposition on the ticket, and the few names written in received but few votes.

A. C. Fisher, who has been the night policeman at the depot, handed in his resignation last night, and F. A. Harwig was chosen to succeed him. E. W. James, A. King and George Horton were suggested by the chief of police as suitable officers. Harwig received 5 votes and James on the first ballot. Mr. Fisher will soon leave for Spokane, where he has a farm which requires his attention. He has proven a capable and efficient officer, and his many friends regret his leaving.

Newspapers Do It. The ordinance bill to regulate the publication of initiative measures, proposed at the last meeting of the council, was lost by a vote of 7 to 5. The new ordinance provided that the new measures should be distributed among the voters in pamphlet form instead of by publication in the newspapers, as is now the custom.

A report from the street committee recommending that the grading of Lafayette street from the west line of Commercial street to the east line of First street be left to the property-owners themselves after the city engineer had established the grade. The report of the committee on accounts and current expenses and the report of the street commissioner of his regular monthly payroll were both adopted. The report of the street committee stating that the drain tile on Columbia street had been installed was adopted.

The committee to which the matter of the billboard at the corner of Hood and High streets was referred reported that they had no power to interfere in the matter. The Parent Teachers' association of the Grant school offered a communication at the last meeting stating that the billboard was a nuisance and should be removed.

Wan \$150 for Band. The report of the city attorney and the street committee to whom was referred the matter of the complaint of the property owners on Front street stating that the Oregon Electric fill had encroached upon his property and asking damages in the sum of several thousand dollars, reported that only in three instances were the encroachments to be found and then only to a slight extent. The petition of the property owners was denied. A resolution from the park board asking that the last \$10000 of their appropriation be turned over was adopted. A petition from John J. Roberts and 36 others asking that the council include \$1500 in their budget for the maintenance of a city band was read and referred to the finance committee. The finance committee asked that the chairman of each of the council committees send in a report stating the amount that would be necessary for the operation of his department for the ensuing year as it was necessary to make up the new budget by December 1.

Attention was called to the condition of the street at the intersection of Church and Mill streets near the end of the bridge. City Recorder Elgin was given permission to destroy the balloons in city elections after they had been preserved for a period of two years after the election. He stated that the vault was now full of defunct election balloons and that they were of no use to anyone.

The Salem Water company presented two bills for water in the city hydrants under the last ruling of the state railroad commission. Mayor Steeves was absent and Councilman Macy was selected to act as temporary chairman of the council.

GERMANS RETREATING

Havre, France, Nov. 3.—The Germans who have been trying to reach the northern French coast are retreating eastward, abandoning their dead and wounded, according to an official statement issued today by the Belgian government which now maintains headquarters here. The Belgians, it was declared, were advancing toward the Yser. On their way they were said to be finding many evidences that the German retreat was a most precipitate one.

SCHOOL BOORD HAS TO ABANDON PLAN

Objection of Property Owners Compels Seeking Another Site for School House

Because adjacent property owners positively refuse to open up streets through their property to permit the children from the Morningside district to conveniently reach the site and to allow the construction of a board sidewalk along the north side of same, the board of directors of the Salem school district last night decided to abandon negotiations for the purchase of what is known as the Voget site in South Salem for the proposed new school building, which had virtually been decided upon at the previous meeting, and will consider other feasible sites that have been offered. This makes the selection of a site and the erection of a new school, to relieve congested conditions, problematical.

The Voget site is situated between High and Commercial streets opposite the cemetery and is considered the most desirably located of all offered, considering convenience to children residing in all parts of the district to be served, but in order to make it available High street should be opened through south to Fairview avenue to accommodate the children in the Morningside district and a street opened up along the north side of the McGilchrist premises to Commercial street.

Other Good Sites Offered. This site consists of one and eight-tenths acres and the price asked is \$5000. Other sites are offered, on the north and south, however, with a greater amount of acreage, one in particular offering sufficient ground for an athletic field, for less money, and the board, rather than be held up on the conditions surrounding the acceptance of the Voget site, will receive negotiations with the other bidders today.

Five thousand dollars is the limit to go in the purchase of a site, and the site offered by Julius Voget fulfills all requirements, with the exception of ingress and egress for the children, and with these concessions denied it looks as though the matter of the selection of a site will be indefinitely deferred, with the likelihood that the matter will not be settled until too late to make provision for the purchase in the next budget, unless negotiations can be brought to a satisfactory conclusion with the other bidders.

Thinks Price Too Low. The chief objector to the conditions attending the closing of the deal to the Voget site, it was reported at last night's meeting, is Wm. McGilchrist, Sr., whose property adjoins the proposed school site on the south, who complains that the price to be paid for the tract is altogether too low and that the board is unreasonable in expecting any additional concessions in connection with the location. On this account, it was stated, Mr. McGilchrist not only refuses to help in the opening of the required street to give access to the site from Commercial street along his property, but positively declines, it is said, to permit the construction of a board sidewalk along his property or any sidewalk other than a cement one and that laid to the proper and official established grade. Mr. Voget and Chairman Miles of the school board, both talked with Mr. McGilchrist upon the subject, but they state that he is determined to stand by his position and will not be moved.

On the south and east of the Voget site is the Ohmart property. To provide means of access to the site from the Morningside district it will be necessary to open and grade High street through this property. The Ohmarts, it is understood, do not object to the children passing through their property to and from the proposed school, but they are not ready to open and grade High street through to Fairview avenue until they are prepared to plat and place their property upon the market in city lots because it necessitates the removal of their barn and destroys their garden patch. They are willing, however, to cooperate and assist in the opening of the street through on the south side of the site in Commercial street.

Mr. Voget was present at the meeting of the board last evening and he explained the manner in which his proposal is being held up, but still has hopes of being able to meet the conditions of the school board.

EXHIBIT AT LIBRARY.

The library has on exhibition a number of photographs of the trees and shrubs of Oregon, which will be the subject of Prof. Sweeney's illustrated lecture at the library next Saturday at 7:15 p. m. Among the most interesting are the red cedar, incense cedar, pine, yew and Oregon grape. Come and see the photographs and get ready for the lecture.

VESEVIUS VIOLENT.

Naples, Nov. 3.—Mount Vesuvius' eruption is becoming more violent today. Mighty streams of lava were pouring down its slopes. The terrified inhabitants were fleeing from the towns and farms in the mountain's vicinity.

PHYSICAL INSTRUCTION IN GRADE SCHOOLS

The inauguration of a complete course in physical culture for all of the pupils of the grade schools in the city school system and for the girl students of the high school was decided upon by the board of school directors at last night's meeting, when Miss Evelyn Cash, formerly of Twin Falls, Idaho, was elected physical instructor to relieve Miss Ethel Merriam, who has been filling the position in the grade schools until a permanent instructor was engaged. Miss Cash will assume her duties at the beginning of the second semester, in February, and her salary has been fixed at \$100 per month.

In the past the board of directors have been unable to arrive at a definite decision regarding the adoption of a full course in physical culture for the school children, for several reasons, but mainly because of the uncertainty of funds available for the purpose, and, in the meantime, Miss Merriam, one of the instructors in the high school, has been detained especially to give instruction in physical culture to the high school girls. Under the new arrangement Miss Merriam will be relieved of this extra duty and will be able to devote all of her time in the school instruction work.

Latest System to be Taught.

Miss Cash is a graduate of the Emerson School of Oratory, of Boston, and at present is taking an advanced course in physical culture in one of the leading training institutions of Chicago. She will introduce into the Salem schools the old Swedish system of physical culture, which embraces full instructions in what is known as "folk games" or dances, to develop grace of movement and poise of the body of the student, with what is known as the Stargant modification, the latest and most approved system of physical culture adopted by all of the principal cities of the United States.

GERMANS ABANDON LEFT BANK OF YSER

Paris, Nov. 3.—The Germans have definitely abandoned all their positions on the left bank of the Yser, it was stated today in the Bordeaux war office's regular afternoon communication to the Paris public.

They were forced from their trenches, the report explained, by the inundation which followed the cutting of the dikes by the Belgians. The allies were said to have occupied their lines as fast as the Germans retired from them. The allied forces were in especial strength below Dixmude.

Renewed German assaults on Arras Monday were said to have been repelled heavily.
