He claims that the telephone company has threatened to disconnect his phone.
The pal of Max Hoagland, young Kelly, with whom he escaped from the Walla Walla jail, and another lad named Arndt were brought back to the Oregon State Training School today and were left in the sheriff's office for safe keeping for a short time. Arndt is a parole violator. Kelly escaped from the Oregon institution and was captured in Walla Walla but escaped from the jail in that place by sawing through a bar in the window. Hoagland is the youth who was captured with Pat Riley after a sensational trip down the valley from the Oregon State Training School.
Passengers on the Shasta Limited southbound through the valley will have an opportunity to sample one of Salem's best products in the shape of the Scotch, of the southern Pacific. The Salem Fruit Union and the Salem canneries are preparing a special brand of the first class product which will be served on the diner and on the menu will be a line stating that the loganberry comes from Salem. It is proposed by this method to secure some valuable advertising for the city and to popularize the fruit with the passengers who go over this line down the coast.
Frederick H. Monroe, a prominent citizen of Chicago, writing to a friend in Portland, has this to say about John Z. White, who lectures in Salem Wednesday, November 4. "We are already planning to nominate Mr. White as a candidate for the nomination by the democratic party for governor of Illinois in 1916." Mr. White speaks at the Unity church on "The Basis of Universal Peace and National Prosperity," under the auspices of the Men's Liberal club. Admission is free, and everybody is invited.

City School Superintendent Elliott reported to the board of school directors at last night's meeting that the blank forms for the taking of the city's school census would be prepared in the course of a day or so and that Amos W. Long, who has been selected to take the census this year, will be ready to start in upon the work either tomorrow or not later than Thursday. It will require at least a month to complete the census.
"No more loaning of school apparatus or equipment" is the edict that was pronounced and emphatically issued by the board of directors of the Salem school district, at last night's meeting when a motion was unanimously adopted which read: "It is the sense of the board that the equipment of the Salem schools should not be allowed to be hired or loaned in the future except for school purposes, and are not to be removed from the school premises." This course was decided upon as a result of the numerous applications from many sources, foreign to school work or educational purposes, for the borrowing of all kinds of school equipment, and particularly for the stereopticon apparatus, and as some of the equipment of the mechanical department is very delicate and valuable, the board feels that it cannot afford to take any chances in loaning any of it.
SUNK GREEN BOAT.
Copenhagen, Nov. 3.--The sinking by British cruisers of a Greek torpedo boat which they were said to have mistaken for a Turkish craft was reported here unofficially today in a dispatch from Berlin. The story was unconfirmed.
