PROBABLY DEFEATED. Portland, Or., Nov. 9.—It appeared this afternoon that the amendment to the state constitution abolishing capital punishment voted on at last Tuesday's election was defeated by a small margin.

VERDICT OF VOTERS IS AGAINST HANGING. Portland, Or., Nov. 9.—Whether the bill abolishing capital punishment as a penalty for murder in Oregon has been adopted by the voters is a question that the returns from Tuesday's election thus far have revealed.

Both the normal school bills seem to have lost in the state at large. With returns from 24 of the 34 counties in the state available—and this includes the figures of most of the populous counties—the Ashland normal is nearly 20,000 votes behind.

Majority against 10,760. Belated returns also continue to give adverse majorities to the Weston normal in Eastern Oregon. Hilk and Washington counties, which reported yesterday, went heavily against both schools.

KAISER'S TROOPS MOVING. The Hague, Nov. 9.—A heavy movement of German troops from France and Belgium was reported here this afternoon to be in progress to the westward.

MORE NEW CASES. Washington, Nov. 9.—Several new cases of the foot and mouth disease were discovered today in Lancaster county, Pa.

John Schultz, who was arrested last week and lodged in the county jail on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon on George Brown, of Newberg, was arraigned in justice court this morning and bound over to the grand jury on \$1000 bonds.

According to a telegram received by E. F. Brown of Greenwood, Polk county, G. Matzke, the father, and Otto Matzke, the brother of the late Robert Matzke, will arrive next Wednesday or Thursday to take charge of the estate of the latter.
