THE VERY LATEST IN WINTER FASHIONS

A chicken, a broiler, a quail and a bird fair woman's been dubbed by mere man. And so she is trying to dress for the part. And wear all the feathers she can.

New York, Nov. 13.—Any sartorial commercial soul can feel feathered in his own nest but it takes a true sartorial genius to feather her own costume artistically. My lady has this winter gone back to her old friend the ostrich for her borrowed plumage. The ostrich plume has returned with added prestige to its high station atop some of the very best hats. It is in its new role of frigate however that it tickles the fashioning fancy most of this season.

The delicacy and softness of this fragile, fairylike fringe of feather fronds makes it a particularly desirable garniture on light fluffy evening frocks, gossamer fingered and diaphanous negligees but it is also pressed into service as suitable trimming on wraps and neck fixings.

A ravishing set of underwear consisting of an underbodice, panties and a petticoat of flesh color Pussycat tulle makes—good saying "heavy" goes but it is also pressed into service as it is of frills and ruffles. Its head-stitched edges are finished with the soft fringe of the flesh colored ostrich frond and a tiny garland of French ribbon roses—one on each pantie, one on the front of the corset cover and four at discreet intervals around the bottom of the petticoat make up its rare simplicity.

An apricot tinted negligee of crepe de chine cut on loose flowing kimono lines relies for ornament solely upon a fringe of apricot ostrich which borders it around the hem, up the fronts and around the neck and sleeves. A coquettish boudoir cap with a frill of ostrich fringe and shirred satin ribbon slippers, feathers around the tops, completes this desirable set.

A perfect dream of a frock which shows the feather trimming off to advantage is worn by the prima donna of "The Little Domino" the first of a season of Opera Comique presented by Andreas Dippel in New York. The dainty gown is built of shell pink satin and tulle. The waist which is a cross between a tight bodice and a semi-fitted jacket is of the satin. It buttons up the front and the low cut neck is finished with a flat sailor collar which extends from shoulder to shoulder in the rear where there is also an upstanding Medical collar of the feather fringe.

The little jacket extends to below the hips where it ends in a feather fringe and its transparent sleeves of the pink net are finished with soft ostrich fronds with the same trimming. The skirt is an ankle length accordion pleated affair of the satin over which two full flounces of the tulle edged with ostrich fringe flaunt their airy charms.

Appropos of Thespian fashions in the window of an exclusive Broadway shop is displayed a gown designed for a well known stage celebrity noted for her original and startling toilettes. This particular frock consists of a soft white blouse of china silk with a demure little around top over collar and a pleated skirt of dark extremely blue serge which buttons with large white pearl buttons high up on the blouse in extremely shortwaisted effect. Straps of the serge passed suspender like over each shoulder.

An obvious steal from the "Little Dorrit" and "David Copperfield" suits affected by all the small fry this past season it truly promised, a certain hollowness chic and piquant simplicity to its grown up wearer.

MOTHER JONES IS BITTER IN ATTACK

Says Rockefeller Works for Jesus but Hires Gunmen—Scores President

Philadelphia, Nov. 13.—Samuel Gompers introduced "Mother" Jones, the famous woman strike leader, to the American Federation of Labor convention here today. She was given an enthusiastic reception by the delegates.

"Mother" Jones denounced both President Wilson and John D. Rockefeller. "Rockefeller works for Jesus but sends his gunmen against the miners when they strike," she said. "If President Wilson were a real man he would give Rockefeller just five days to settle the disagreement in Colorado."

"The Colorado fight is not for increased wages but for constitutional rights. Colorado has the finest labor laws of any state in the union but they have been set aside by high class burglars."

"The fight in Colorado, West Virginia and Michigan is a fight for the bread. The rights of the miners in Colorado were destroyed by the Colorado Fuel and Iron company."

"Men of America, you will never guess the atrocities committed against workmen in Colorado unless another Victor Hugo comes to portray them. Children were burned and others, without food, wanted away until death relieved their sufferings. Upon the mangled hearts of these children is built Rockefeller's wealth."

"When I heard the screams of these dying children, I said, 'oh, my God! I wish I could send those screams to Washington. Perhaps they would move the president to action.'"

"Good Chance for Villa." "Men and women of the labor movement, get together, and if Rockefeller is president of this country, let's once more fight for our liberties."

"If President Wilson were a man he would give Rockefeller just five days to settle the Colorado strike, and if Rockefeller refused he would say to him: 'The American flag then will go over those mines.'"

Mother Jones reviewed a recent mine explosion in New Mexico, declaring the mine was not equipped with any safety devices.

Then she told of meeting General Francisco Villa of Mexico.

"I told Villa," she said, "that it would be a fine thing if he would come over to see us and that we could use him to good advantage."

Rockefeller of California extended an invitation to the delegation to meet in San Francisco next year.

Tonight 30,000 unionists will participate in a parade along Broad street.

CORN SHOW OPENS FINE SAMPLES SHOWN

The Marion County Corn Show opened this morning in the Public Market building with an excellent representation of the corn grown in this locality on exhibition. Not all of the exhibit is in place yet and more is coming in to be displayed. The bad weather last week has prevailed for the last two days has prevented many from bringing in their exhibits personally, but it is expected that by tomorrow a full exhibit will be shown.

Long ears, short ears, yellow ones and white ones, spotted ears, red ears, large fat ones and others that are long and slim are being shown in every variety. Visitors who have lived in the corn belt of the United States pronounce the present exhibit to be a good one as far as it goes. The great quantities of perfect ears that are seen in eastern corn shows are not in evidence here as it is expected, as the primary purpose of the corn show was to demonstrate to the farmers of this county that corn can be grown in commercial quantities as well in Oregon as it can be grown in many of the so-called corn growing states.

This purpose has been fulfilled, according to Luther J. Chapin, who has charge of the exhibit, and there is every reason to believe that the corn crop will grow rapidly in importance in this county. A special demonstration of the germination test for seed corn will be performed tomorrow afternoon for the benefit of the prospective corn growers who desire to get the latest methods in vogue in corn culture.

A TERRIFIC EXPLOSION

New York, Nov. 13.—One person was killed and 20 injured in an explosion at the Beck Chemical works in Brooklyn this afternoon. A number of surrounding buildings were badly damaged.

Some unidentified man with both arms blown off was removed from the debris. He was expected to die. The police believe there may be other victims in the ruins, but it was said the fatalities would not exceed three.

UNCLE SAM HANDED A KNOTTY PROBLEM

Washington, Nov. 13.—That a new construction on the Monroe doctrine from the German viewpoint may be put up to President Wilson and the state department if the United States, even in the slightest degree, attempts to interfere with shipments of coal to Germany, vessels from South American countries was the declaration here today of a high diplomat. It was pointed out that America does not attempt to prevent the shipment of arms and ammunition from Canada to England, and therefore, Germany is ready to ask why America should complain if an other part of America, equally affected as Canada by the Monroe doctrine, makes continental shipments in German vessels.

ALLIES ARE GAINING

London, Nov. 13.—The allies have recaptured Dixmude, according to an unconfirmed news agency dispatch received here tonight from northern France. French marines, the dispatch said, drove the enemy out at the point of bayonets after the German positions had been shelled.

SEVEN FIREMEN KURT.

Cincinnati, Ohio, Nov. 13.—Seven firemen were injured here this afternoon, two probably fatally, when a salvage corps automobile truck collided with a fire wagon. Both were responding to an alarm.

CARRANZA TALKS

El Paso, Nov. 13.—The following statement, attributed to General Carranza, was received here this afternoon from Cordoba:

"I have always been and am now disposed to retire, but it is not my duty to deliver the government over to a regime that has been named by Villa and which will be managed by him. Should I retire within the next few weeks, the people would reproach me in the future for being weak and abandoning the country to its enemies."

"I believe I should not abandon power until a stable government has been established and Villa himself eliminated."

A statement was also received from General Obregon, in which he said he was ready to clash with the convention's forces.
