WHAT WAS SPENT AND WHO SPENT IT. United States Senator George E. Chamberlain expended \$717.41 in behalf of his own candidacy in connection with the general election, according to his statement filed with the secretary of state. C. S. Jackson, editor of the Portland Journal, expended \$750 favoring the public "shaves and docks" bill on the ballot, and the Oregon Commercial protective association and A. C. Spencer, on behalf of the O.-W. R. & N., S. P., P. R. L. & P., and S. P. & S. railroads, expended an aggregate of \$5,559.39 in opposing these measures. Paul Turner, of Salem, stated that he spent \$626.90 favoring the abolition of the death penalty, and T. J. Stiles, secretary of the 322 X Yea club, of Albany, expended \$364.46 in favor of the prohibition amendment, and Mrs. Margaret Houston, state treasurer of the W. C. T. U., expended \$3,548.16 in favoring the "dry" amendment. C. E. S. Wood spent \$132.75 in promoting the candidacy of William Hanley for United States senator. George L. Mason, manager of the non-partisan league, expended \$7,948.97 in opposing the \$1,500 tax exempting measure and others of the single-tax brand and in favoring other tax bills. Louis S. Winters and J. S. O. Wilson expended an aggregate of \$750 in behalf of the candidacy of Will E. Purdy for governor.

WOULD BLOCK CANAL. London, Nov. 12.—The Chronicle told the story today of Lieutenant Mors, a German officer recently sentenced to life imprisonment at Alexandria, Egypt, following his conviction on a charge of plotting to block the Suez canal by blowing up a ship in the channel, so as to hamper the British in getting troops to Europe from Australia and India. It was stated that he was to have received \$50,000 for his work.

DEFENDS MOTHERHOOD. New York, Nov. 12.—Mayor Mitchell recently wrote the board of education urging the abolition of the rule that married teachers would be dismissed if they became mothers. He declared today that within the last 24 hours he had received an impression that the board will adopt the reasonable, wise and rational policy of allowing some sort of leave of absence to teachers about to become mothers.

Late Yesterday. At Tokio.—It was admitted that Japanese casualties in the fighting with the Germans at Kiao Chau exceeded 1500.

At London.—Arthur Henderson, labor leader in the House of Commons, said British organized labor wanted the war fought to a finish.

At San Francisco.—Calling at the grocery store run by his wife, who was suing him for divorce, Charles Barner shot himself dead.

At San Francisco.—Cashier A. M. Ramsey, of the Sperry Flour company, was crushed to death while trying to enter a moving elevator.

At London.—It was announced that Lord Roberts, though 82, would visit the continental fighting line to see the British troops in action.

At Pikeville, Ky.—Twelve hundred indictments had been returned, and it was said many more were coming, for Pike county election frauds.

At San Francisco.—Secretary Bogart, of the Associated Charities, said the organization was in danger of having to close its doors as a result of a \$30,000 deficit.

At San Francisco.—The chamber of commerce reported that San Francisco's trade with Atlantic ports has increased about 250 per cent as a result of the Panama canal's completion.

At London.—The admiralty posted the names of 52 commissioned and warrant officers supposedly lost with the cruiser Good Hope, list including the name of Admiral Christopher Craddock.

At Charleston, S. C., Nov. 12.—E. C. Perkins, temporarily insane from an overdose of headache powder, ran amuck today on the Clyde liner Mohawk, killed one passenger, fatally wounded the captain and seriously injured several passengers. The Mohawk docked here this afternoon. Perkins had up a terrific fight in a local hospital, seriously wounding one of the stewards.
