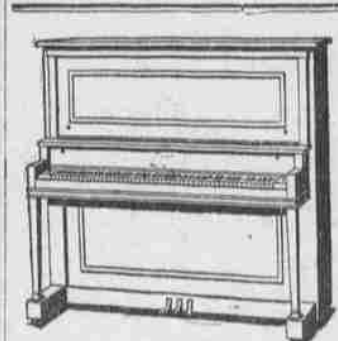

BRITISH DREADNAUGHT AUDACIOUS IS SUNK. New York, Nov. 14--The New York Evening Post this afternoon printed a story, which it declared, confirmed reports of sinking of the British dreadnaught Audacious in the North sea. The vessel was mined, the Post story said, on October 27. The Post's information was based on mail advices received today from the north of Ireland. A mine or torpedo, it was said, disabled the Audacious and the steamship Olympic rescued every member of its crew of 800 except one or two. The rescues were said to have been effected in a rough sea. If the Post story is true it means that the British admiral has suppressed the facts in the case.

PANAMA CANAL CLOSED. Panama, Nov. 14.--Navigation in the Panama canal was again stopped today, another upheaval at the bottom of Culebra cut on the east bank occurring late yesterday. Traffic will not be resumed until the cut is entirely cleared.

CITY NEWS

James Grady, who was picked up by the city marshal of Turner and brought to this city some time ago as a suspect for store robbery, was released today from the county jail after serving a 15-day sentence for vagrancy. Grady had over a dozen new knives, half a dozen razors, some purses and a number of other articles, all new, and the officers thought he had robbed a store to acquire them. The goods could not be identified, however, and Grady was permitted to leave town.
