 Dallas, Ore., Nov. 14.—Mr. D. Hubbard, an old and respected citizen of this vicinity, died at his home about two miles west of Dallas, Tuesday, November 10. Mr. Hubbard has been a sufferer with cancer of the stomach for some time, and it was this that caused his death. He leaves to mourn his death four children: Charles, of Falls City; Mrs. Grace McNeil, of Walla Walla, Wash.; Mrs. Olive Sellers and J. D. Hubbard, of this city. Mrs. Hubbard died several years ago. The deceased was born in Oregon City on December 21, 1847, but has lived in Polk county continuously since 1852. The funeral services were held from the

### To Fight Dry Election

Suit has been filed with the county clerk of Polk county by B. A. Kikka, an attorney from McMinnville, representing the saloonmen of Dallas, who seeks to enjoin the county court and other county officials from issuing and enforcing an order declaring that the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited in this city as the result of the local option election held on November 3. In the complaint it is alleged that the election was irregular and illegal in that the election was held by precincts that do not coincide with the boundaries of the city and that in consequence some of the officials who conducted the election were not residents of the city. That non-residents of the city were permitted to vote on the question and that others, residents of the city, were not permitted to vote at all. The matter of issuing the order declaring the result of the election will come up in the county court next Monday.

### Company L to See 'Trisco

Conrad Staffin, captain of Company L, O. N. G., has received word that the Third regiment of the Oregon guards will be taken to the Panama-Pacific exposition at San Francisco next summer. The trip will consume 14 days and will be made on a special train that will leave Portland June 10, 1915. Ten days of the time will be spent in camping upon the exposition grounds and the rest of the time will be taken up in coming and going to the southern city. Only 50 men to a company will be allowed for the trip, and as Company L now has an enlisted strength of 86 men there will have to be a weeding out of some before the time of departure. Captain Staffin will probably wait until some time next spring before undertaking to choose his men, and it is the intention to take only those who attend the weekly drills as it is the desire to make as good a showing for the Dallas company as possible.
