OREGON INDUSTRIES

Ninety-one electric generating plants in operation in Oregon during the fiscal year which closed June 30, 1914, according to reports received by Labor Commissioner Hoff, utilized a total of 237,475 horsepower in propelling the machinery of their plants and generated an aggregate total of 180,097,135 kilowatt-hours of electric energy, for illumination and power purposes. They gave employment to a total of 460 people and paid out in wages and salaries during the year a total of \$601,696. The combined value of all of the plants was \$5,800,000. Three plants engaged in the manufacture and repair of elevators in the state have an aggregate value of \$3,758 and the year's output of products were valued at \$163,315. Thirty-two employees of these plants received in wages and salaries during the year a total of \$39,703. Seven electric fixture plants valued at \$36,275, gave employment to 35 people during the year and paid out in wages and salaries \$36,824.

LENGTH OF HOLIDAY IS NOT YET DECIDED

Whether It Will Be One Week or Two Is the Question, and Good Reasons Are Advanced in Favor of Each.

Thanksgiving day, Thursday, November 26, and the day following were declared holidays in the Salem public schools by the board of school directors in regular session last evening, but whether there will be one or two weeks vacation during the Christmas and New Year holiday season is a question that was wrestled with by the board for about half an hour and it was finally decided to let the matter rest until the next regular meeting, Monday evening, December 8.

The subject was broached by School Superintendent Elliott, who stated that

With a one-week vacation period, the schools would close on December 23 and reopen on January 3, while, with a two-weeks' vacation period the schools would close from December 18 to January 3. The point was brought out during the discussion that a one-week vacation period would bring the Willamette university and high school graduation exercises within the same week and this would not be popular with parents who were interested in the commencement exercises of both institutions. It also developed that, upon being put to a vote, the teachers of the Park school had voted unanimously in favor of a one-week vacation period and that at another school all of the teachers with one exception were also in favor of one week's vacation. It was finally decided to carry the matter over until the December meeting, and in the meantime the exact dates of the Willamette university commencement exercises should be ascertained.
