Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 18.—Ten Thousand tickets of admission to the football game between the University of California and the Oregon Agricultural college, to be played in the high school stadium here Thanksgiving day, were placed on sale today. The proceeds are to be devoted to the relief of Belgian war refugees in the war zone. The tickets are offered at 50 cents each, but all remaining unsold next Tuesday night will be withdrawn and thereafter the charge will be \$1. The stadium will accommodate more than 30,000 persons and it is expected that a large sum will be realized for the Belgian relief fund.

The Sons of Veterans will entertain Sedgwick Post, G. A. B., at the armory Thursday evening, November 19, at 7:30, and celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of Lincoln's Gettysburg address.

'Constipation in all of its aspects, with special reference to its causes,' was the subject of the address of Dr. R. C. Coffey, of Portland, before the regular monthly meeting of the Marion, Polk and Yamhill County Medical society, which was held in the chapel at the Oregon State hospital last evening. ALASKAN STEAMER DIRIGO FOUNDERED

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 18.—The steamship Dirigo, owned by the Alaska Steamship company, foundered at 5 o'clock Monday afternoon 100 miles west of Cape Spencer, on the Alaska coast, in a heavy easterly gale and sea.

She was in tow of the steamer Corvoja and the 12 men on board were taken off with no loss of life. The Dirigo, however, is a total loss. The Dirigo had been on the run from Seward westward, including the Alutian islands and Unalaska, taking the place of the steamer Dora. She was being brought to Seattle to be overhauled and have oil burners installed. The Dirigo took a prominent part in the first Klondike rush from 1898 until 1905.
